THE WOMAN WHO DID.

Condensed in a Sermon by the Canon of St. James.

Canon Dumoulin, at the nuptial service in St. James' Cathedral yesterday, contrasted the Bible with any other literature which the genius of man had produced. The world is flooded with books, magazines, newspapers. This is a reading age. Toronto has her daily newspapers. Then there is the rush of novels, of the making of which there is no end. Some are evil and pernicious. Amongst the latter he instanced Grant Allen's recent book, "The Woman Who Did." And what did she? Discarded the holy sacrament of marriage, tore down, as it were, a golden institution. The person consorts with her lover without marriage. And this is the literature which it is said to think read with such avidity.

Then the Canon turned to another effect of the omnivorous reading of the day. It led to the neglect of the greatest book—the well of English undefiled, the Bible. A former generation knew more of the Bible than the present one. This is proved by the answers given by members of confirmation classes and Sunday schools. These young people did not read the Bible as their grandfathers and grandmothers did. In this restless age there is the impatience of the greatest method of teaching and preaching from the Bible. No one now hears the reading of leaves of the Bible. The sermon turned in following the teaching of the preacher. Sensationalism, rather than the subject of which is most popular in the pulpit.

The Canon then pointed out the evils of the neglect of the Bible. He said that in the family, and yet in the Bible God speaks His word to the people. He said that the Bible is the source of the human race, and daily life, and conduct. The greatest philosophers, poets and cultivated men have been indebted greatly to their habitual study of the Scriptures, proof whereof the preacher gave in the cases of Shakespeare, Bacon, Newton, Milton, and to come down to a great living statesman, Mr. Gladstone, who, amidst all the cares of his many public and private duties, found time to devote to the study of the Bible. Out of the many well-known men who were recently of the books that had most influenced them, ten out of every twelve included the Bible or books having their inspiration from the Bible. In conclusion the preacher spoke of the beauty of the Scriptures and the benefits to be derived from the morning and evening lessons in the Book of Common Prayer.

The Township Council met at the Town Hall, Eglington, on Monday, and transacted a lot of routine business. It was decided to refer the case of the Township v. ex-Reeve Humbersone to arbitration. Henry Duncan, New York, was appointed arbitrator in the Township in the matter of widening the Davenport road on the highway between Henry and Shuter. The Reeve and the clerk were authorized to execute the agreement of the Georgian Bay Ship Canal. The Board of Public Works was authorized to purchase Company as soon as the company had paid the charges incurred by the council in considering the matter. The agreement signed by thirty residents of Deer Park was submitted, asking to prevent cattle running at large in the neighborhood. The clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law dealing with the matter at the next meeting. The treasurer's statement showed that up to date \$51,807 taxes had been collected, leaving an unpaid balance of \$30,616. Mr. Gibson of Vaughan sent in a claim of \$200 for damages sustained by a defective bridge on the Township. The case was left to the Township Solicitor. The council adjourned till the 15th inst., when they will hold a special meeting.

THE MARKETS ARE WEAKER

FREE SELLING OF CHICAGO WHEAT IN THE AFTERNOON. Provisions Also Are Lower—The Local Stock Market Dull and Steady—Except Securities Fall and Close, Except Wheat, 100 to 105—Latest Financial and Commercial News.

Wednesday Evening, April 3. Earnings of Canadian Pacific for fourth week of March were \$385,000, a decrease of \$48,000. In Montreal Canadian Pacific was active and weak, selling from 41 down to 38 1/2 and closing at 38 5/8. Consols easier, closing at 104 3/4 for 100; 104 3/4 for 100; 104 3/4 for 100. Canadian Pacific is lower, closing in London today at 40, and in New York at 31 1/4. St. Paul closed in London at 59, Erie at 10 3/8, Reading at 6 7/8 and N.Y.C. at 9 1/8. The world's visible supply of wheat decreased 2,338,000 bushels the past week. Breadstuffs reports a decrease of 2,411,000 bushels east of Rockies and an increase of 279,000 west; net decrease 2,132,000 bushels. In Europe and about the decrease is 206,000 bushels in wheat, while corn shows an increase of 3000 bushels.
