## NATIONAL DEFENCE

CONSIDERATION OF PURCHASE OF BUFFALO AIRCRAFT

Hon. Marcel Lambert (Edmonton West): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of National Defence. Can the minister tell the house whether his department is considering the purchase of up to 25 Buffalo aircraft from the de Havilland Corporation; and will he tell the house who the ubiquitous spokesman is who is always giving the reports to the press?

Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, I can only say that the initial stages of the Buffalo program have now been nearly completed, and I refer to the development of the aircraft on a cooperative basis by the United States army, the Department of Defence Production and the de Havilland company. A number of aircraft have been flown and are being given tests of evaluation.

It is only normal at this stage that the Department of National Defence would consider whether there is any requirement for these aircraft in respect of the roles that our forces will be asked to carry out in the future. No decision has yet been taken.

In respect of the latter part of the question, I am just as curious as my hon. friend.

Mr. Harold E. Winch (Vancouver East): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct a question to the Minister of National Defence. In view of the statements in the press about the allegations, claims, possibilities or probabilities with regard to changes in the national defence policy, regarding airplane purchases, could I ask the minister whether, if no decision has been made as yet, he will consider discussing this matter with the house and the defence committee before a decision is reached?

Mr. Hellyer: Mr. Speaker, the requirements are set out in the white paper in general terms. I am not sure whether the committee had an opportunity to discuss these matters at their previous sittings, but I would think the department has to accept its responsibility for the administration of the policy which has been laid down by the government and accepted by the committee in making selections which it can recommend to the House of Commons.
