ANNOUNCEMENT OF APPOINTMENT OF C. B. KOESTER, ESQUIRE, AS CLERK

Mr. Speaker: I have the honour to inform the House that the governor in council has appointed Charles Beverley Koester, Esquire, C.D., M.A., Ph.D., as Clerk of the House of Commons in the place of Alistair Fraser, B.A., LL.B., resigned.

May I borrow just a moment from the House at this juncture to say two things. First, it is self-evident that no Speaker can survive without the constant counsel, advice, support and assistance of the Clerk of the House of Commons. In all of the Speaker's responsibilities, some of which are very visible in the chamber and many of which are lesser known in administrative capacities, in the direction of the House of Commons personnel and organizations and things of that sort, in every respect a Speaker is lost without the constant support and advice on procedural matters, administrative matters and in every way of the Clerk of the House of Commons.

Having worked with Dr. Koester, I have every confidence that we are in the best possible hands at this moment, and I look forward to his very wise and already demonstrated able counsel in assisting me through the years to come.

May I also say that since I have been the Speaker of this House, and for some time prior to that, I and predecessors of mine were the beneficiairies of the excellent counsel and advice of Mr. Alistair Fraser, who distinguished himself as Clerk of the House of Commons and, finally, just as he was leaving office, I think put a fitting stroke into the history book of our procedures and practices by being a co-editor and co-author of the most recent revision of Beauchesne's parliamentary procedures. It is an excellent work and stands as a tribute to him.

I felt at this moment as we change Clerks of the House of Commons that the House would want to join me in paying tribute to Alistair Fraser for all of his great years of excellent and faithful service to the House of Commons, and at the same time wish Dr. Koester, the new Clerk of the House of Commons, the same kind of success with which Mr. Fraser distinguished himself.
