Being anxious to return to England, I engaged the cabin of a fmall veffel bound to Oporto; and on the 11th of July I embarked with Mrs. Fellowes, Colonel Cooke, Captain Thomas, Mr. Bargus the mafter, and the Colonel's fervant, who, during the voyage home, loft feveral of his toes, in confequence of what he had fuffered. The mafter's mate was left in charge of the fhip's company, and was directed to conduct them to Halifax; whence they would be enabled to return by the first opportunity to their own country.

After taking leave of our hospitable friends at St. John's, and after recommending to their protection the companions of our flardships, we put to sea with favourable weather. During a voyage of fifteen days we had a few difficulties to encounter, such as pumping continually, the vessel having sprung a leak in a gale of wind; and we were obliged to throw overboard a considerable quantity of her cargo of falt-fish.

On the 26th of July we fell in with an American ship, the Bristol Trader, of New
