- 1766, Jan. 1. Non importation of British goods takes place in the associated colonies of North America.

- March. Stamp-act repealed in the House of Commons by 275 to 167: in the Lords by 105 to 71.—Protest of 33 entered, March 10.—Received the Royal assent on the 18th.
- March 18. Declaratory-act received the Royal affent.
- June 6. Bill to indemnify perions in America from penaltics incurred by the Stamp act.
- Dec. 6. Act of indemnification and oblivion passed by the Assembly of Massachusett's Bay.
- Dec. The Assembly of Massachusett's Bay deny the legislative authority of the British Parliament.
- 1767, Jan. 28. The Assembly of Massachusett's Bay refuse to provide for the troops at Boston.
- June 29. Bill for granting certain duties in the British colonies and plantations of North America, received the Royal assent. Also, an act for the better regulation of the Customs and Duties'.
