## . TORONTO PEUPLE TALK OVER SEWAGE MATTERS

Engineer Rust's Keport Will Soon be to Hand-J. W. Banton is New President.

NORTH TORONTO, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—The opening meeting of the North Toronto Katepayers' Association, held in the town hair here on Saturday evening, was, taken all in all a fairly representative one, tho in point of numbers there was little to attract attention. Probably altogether less than forty ratepayers were in the room, but they were men deeply interested in the progress of the town, and were out to ask and impart instruction.

In the outset a good deal of difficulty was experienced in securing officers to nil the several positions. For president, W. G. Ellis, Robert Ferguson, George Rennie, H. H. Ball, T. W. Banton, N. G. Clarke, D. D. Reid, Welter Muston Frank Howe and others were nomicated but each and all declined acceptance of the honor. Finally T. W. Banton was prevailed upon to allow his name to go before the meeting, with the result that he was unanimously chosen. The new president is generally regarded as eminently fitted for the duties of the office. Well informed on all town matters level-headed, and possessing, as he does, the respect of everybody, the new president will make an admirable presiding officer.

The other officers elected are: Geo. Rennie, first vice-president; Chas. Adamson, second vice-president; chas. Adamson, second vice-president, and A. E. Brockelsby, secretary-treasurer. The members of the executive are: Messrs. Ellis, Leach, Reid, Stevenson, Richards and Aull.

Having cleared the decks for action, and following the president's address, in which he made it clear that every-body would get a fair chance to air his views, the meeting cast about for some subject to which they could devote the balance of the evening in discussion. Naturally one of the two uppermost topics in the town, sewage, was seized upon and Councillor D. D. Reid, as chairman of the sewage committee, was called upon to outline what action, if any, had been taken by the town council along this line.

"Sewage and annexation are so interdependent that we can scarcely consider the one without the other." said the chairman, and the meeting gave to Councillor Reid the very best attention.

On a large blue-print prepared by T. Aird Muriay, C.E., Mr. Reid pointed

He lauded it as a panacea for the relief of all the trouble in North Tolonto. The cost of a local system, in his opinion, would be less than would follow in the event of connection with the city system, both in cost of installation and in point of land damages. In fact, the chairman of the sewage confinites made it plain that he was 'agin' buty connection, tho he claimed to be aldently in fayor of annexation. "Let's put in our own sewage system hist and get annexation atterwands," he said.


