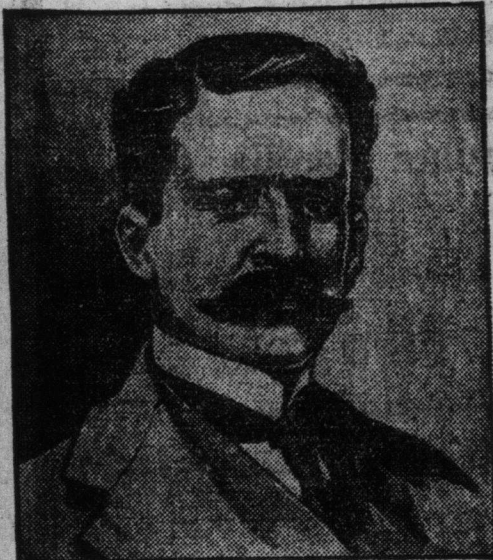

DAYS NEW YORK MAY SEE AN AWFUL HOLOCAUST

Under Present Conditions Such a
Fire as Devastated Frisco Quite
Within Possibilities.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The Merritt joint legislative commission of enquiry adjourned sine die this afternoon still with no word from the missing city chamberlain, Chas. H. Hyde, who is a Nova Scotian. An evening paper offered a reward of \$100 for the first person to give information of his whereabouts, providing he does not publicly appear at his office before Jan. 15.

Harold Herrick, president of the Niagara Fire Insurance Co., a witness, told the committee that New York may yet see such a fire as devastated San Francisco.

"A holocaust in New York," he said.

"It is quite within the bounds of possibility that we have an excellent fire department, and an efficient chief, and thus far have jumped on every fire and put it out; but no fire department ever existing subdued a conflagration once it got under way. It only ceased when it reached a natural obstacle."

"If New York has a fire like San Francisco, God help us. There would not be a solvent insurance company left in the world. No one could compute the billions of loss."

Hurried, cheap construction by speculators, and poorly installed heating plants, said Mr. Herrick, were responsible for one-third of all fires, and a greater share of their spread.

"But in the City of Hamburg," he continued, "where they won't tolerate poor construction, there has not been a fire that spread outside the house in which it started since 1842."

Fireman Under Fallen Wall.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The falling wall of a fire-swept factory building on Wooster street buried a fireman on the second floor in its debris to-day. Chief Crocker and a squad of firemen, who narrowly escaped the crash, extricated the pinned man, who was but slightly injured.

CHURCH AND BIG STICK Aggressive Controller in Hot Pursuit of Street Railway.

Controller, Church will move at Monday's inaugural meeting of council.

That the legislation committee report on the following legislation to be applied for the street railway matter:

(a) For "turning right" over the Toronto Railway Company's tracks of the cars of the city's municipal street car line on terms to be agreed on or determined by the Ontario Railway Board on an interchange of traffic as to passengers, either on a car basis or passenger basis.

(b) To abolish trailers on and after August 1, 1911.

(c) To prevent operation of any P.A.Y.E. cars without proper P.A.Y.E. cars.

(d) To repeal clauses of Railway Act giving power to impose penalties for breach of bylaws.
