## Note and Comment

No cleverer boxer has ever been shown in the city than Matt Wells, and many was the sport coming away from the game street Theatre last night when he had seen him against a harder proposition than Fighting Dick Donovan. The Dublin champion has everything that goes to make one, fast work, quick with both hands, especially the left, clever at blocking and slipping blows and best of all, looks capable of standing punishment. Weather Wells is game or can hit hard was not displayed last night. He has a style a lot like Young Griffe, the Australian, who has landed more blows in a given time than any other fighter before or after.

The official ruling by which Ty Cobb, the brilliant outfielder of the Detroit Tigers, who has been making baseball records by a half dozen acquiring a semi-professional team, was nullified in detail by the national commission yesterday and shows the commission's opinion of the best of the game and the best of the player. It is interesting to show the position of the commission and is important because of the warning it contains to other players who may offend. The ruling was: "It has come to the notice of the commission that Cobb of the Detroit Club participated in an exhibition game with Lenox Oval, New York City, on Sunday, Sept. 1, as a member of an all-star team. Investigation fully established the violation by this player of the notice promulgated by the commission in finding No. 13, reading as follows:

"Club owners operating under the national agreement will be prohibited from granting permission to their players to play with or against club owners, except in games arranged by club owners in the regular way, in which instance the players can only play with the clubs having contracts for their services, nor will national agreement players be permitted to play with or against club owners off days during their contract period."

When required to submit a defense, and warned that repetition of the offense would result in his suspension, the player wired the commission on Sept. 23 as follows: "I am ignorant of doing a wrong. I went to play against tomorrow, but on receipt of your letter have called my part of game off and won't go and won't go and won't go there. It was not my wish to antagonize organized ball." Ty Cobb.

The player's declaration of intention to antagonize organized baseball is given consideration by the commission, but cannot be taken into account in his responsibility for a wrongful act. Players will not be permitted to violate with impunity the regulations for the protection of territorial rights of clubs, and a fine of \$100 or suspension with a warning to him and all other major league players that a more severe penalty will be inflicted on offenders in future.

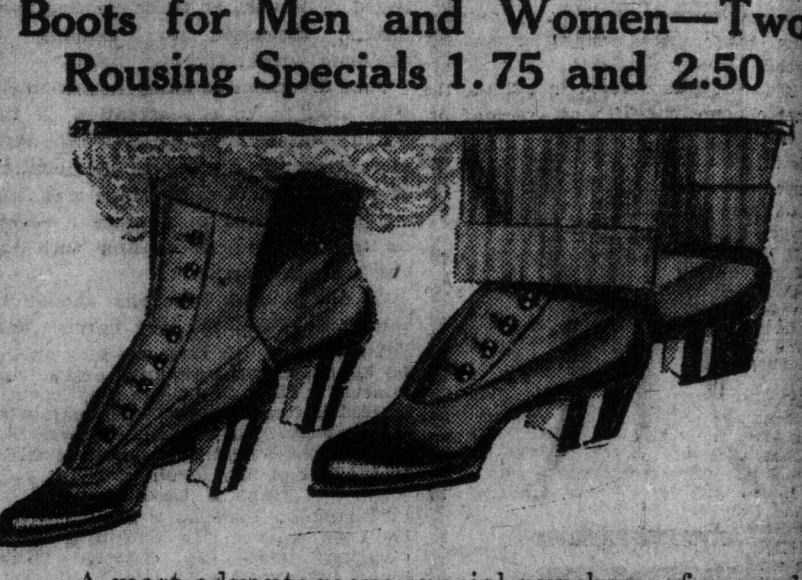
