LAW TO CONTROL FEMALE REFUGES

Will Limit Magistrates Powers Concerning Indefinite Sentences.

Legislation that will affect in many ways industrial refugees for females in Ontario is now before the legislature. Heretofore it was permitted magistrates to sentence females between the ages of 15 and 35 years to industrial refuges for an indefinite period not exceeding five years.

Parents or guardians are also permitted to have children placed in these institutions without judicial enquiry.

The main object of the new act is to take care of these obvious discrepancies. Hereafter magistrates will only be permitted to sentence females to these institutions for an indeterminate period not exceeding two years. The inspector is given power to parole inmates upon such conditions as may be deemed proper, and it will be necessary for the superintendents to keep records of the conduct of inmates with a view to permitting them to be released on parole. The bill also provides that all inmates shall be examined by the medical practitioner in charge, and reports forwarded to the department in order that the officials may be thoroughly advised as to the health of the inmates. Provision is made for removal of feeble-minded inmates to hospitals for proper treatment, and a similar provision is made for those suffering from diseases. A board of three legally qualified medical practitioners will pass upon those inmates who are to be transferred. No person can be sent to these institutions except on warrant signed by a judge of the supreme court, county court or police magistrate. Due provision is made for the hearing of cases in private.

The law as amended will provide that regulations pertaining to the management and discipline of such institutions, as well as regulations governing maintenance, employment, instruction, correction, punishment and reward of inmates, may only be passed by the various boards with the approval of the lieutenant-governor-in-council upon recommendation of the inspector.
