OSCAR L. BOOZ HAS SUCCEEDED FROM HAZING AT WEST POINT THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY LINE IS TO BE SPEEDILY SETTLED.

His Parents Say the Other Cadets Poured Tobacco Sauce Down His Throat, Threw Red Pepper in His Eyes and Otherwise "Treated Him so That He Died.

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 3.—Oscar L. Booz, a former cadet at West Point Military Academy, who had been hazing at the point of death his brother, Ernest Booz, suffering from injuries which his parents claim were the result of hazing at the academy over two years ago, died today.

The cause of death was tuberculosis, according to the doctors. Booz was appointed a cadet by Congressman Wagner of the Seventh Pennsylvania District, and it is alleged by the young man's father that tobacco sauce was poured down his throat while the cadets were hazing him. The father also claims that red pepper was thrown in his eyes, and that he was otherwise treated.

FIVE KILLED IN INSTANT ALL THE FOREIGN ENVOYS Boiler of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Power House at Chicago Exploded

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Four men and one boy were instantly killed and 23 persons injured by the explosion of a boiler at the power house of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway at Chicago this evening. Several of the injured are hurt so badly that they may die.

Augustus Claman, section foreman, killed by falling debris, about 40 years old, blown thru roof of building and fearfully mangled.

Unidentified man about 30 years old, blown thru roof of building, one leg torn off and otherwise mangled.

AND THE RESULT WAS SERIOUS PRINCE CHING AND LI HUNG CHANG Are Anxiously Awaiting the Demands of the Powers—News From Waldersee.

Pekin, Dec. 3.—All the foreign envoys have now heard from their governments regarding the demand for a complete settlement of all questions involved. The envoys are not communicative, but enough is known with reference to the objections of different countries to make it seem doubtful that the meeting will have a satisfactory conclusion.

Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang both say that they are anxious waiting for the demands of the powers. They declare that China desires peace at any price, commensurate with the dignity of an independent nation; but they point out that, so long as the Chinese states, and 200 million souls of China, the problem will be harder to solve. They also say that the Chinese representatives are not communicative, but enough is known with reference to the objections of different countries to make it seem doubtful that the meeting will have a satisfactory conclusion.

A TREACHEROUS MASSACRE. Governor of Shanai Invalied Missionaries to His Home and Butchered

Berlin, Dec. 3.—A special dispatch from China to The Cologne Volks-Zeitung reports a fearful mission massacre in the Province of Shanai, where twelve missionaries and Chinese converts, and four European priests, Franciscan, Italian and Jesuit, were killed.

The missionaries were with their families at the Governor's residence, when a number of Chinese soldiers, and a number of Chinese priests, entered the house and shot and killed the missionaries and their families.

GERMAN FLAG T MING TOMBS. Pavilion Expedition Sent Out for Count Waldersee Has Completed

Berlin, Dec. 3.—A dispatch from Field Marshal Count von Waldersee, Commander-in-Chief of the international forces in China, sent from Peking under date of Saturday, says that after hoisting the German flag at the Ming Tombs and publishing several neighboring villages in good faith to the missionaries, he is now on his way to Yang Fang, Chenshengchen, Tangshan and other villages in the province of Chihai northward of Peking.

President McKinley, in His Message to Congress, Says the Modus Vivendi is, at Best, but an Unsatisfactory Makeshift, and Clings to Russian Treaty.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The second session of the fifty-sixth Congress of the United States opened at noon today. The opening was purely formal and consisted chiefly of the reading of the President's message.

Chinese difficulties are made the chief subject of the President's address delivered at the convening of Congress today. In elaborate detail, he set forth the details of military operations and diplomatic steps taken in the progress of settlement. The circular note to the powers, of July 3, is cited and reaffirmed, and the opinion is expressed that the time has come for a complete settlement of all questions involved.

New York, Dec. 3.—Edward R. Quinn, 33 years old, editor of the magazine, "Success for Americans," registered at the Delaware House Friday last. He went to his room and turned on the water in the tub for the purpose of taking a bath. He had shut off the hot water, and allowed the cold water to run. During his absence from the room the cold water was turned off and the hot water allowed to run. The temperature of the water, jumped in the tub and he scalded to death.

THE SUB TO OCCUPY PARADE FRENCH PAPERS ARE GREATLY SURPRISED, BUT ONE WRITER IN PARIS SAYS IT IS THE BEST THING THAT COULD HAVE HAPPENED.

Official Circles in Germany Express Approval of the Emperor's Attitude, But Some Sections of the Population Are Displeased—Dr. Leyds Blamed for the Rebuff.

Paris, Dec. 3.—A special despatch from Cologne says Mr. Kruger, after he had received Emperor William's telegram, spoke as follows to a deputation of the "freedom of the press":

"I hope with all my heart that the circumstances which prevent His Majesty from receiving me today will become more favorable later. I shall never cease to have confidence in the spirit of justice of the Emperor, who, without knowing me, sent me four years ago significant encouragement. I shall stay some time at the Hague, and will then return my request, and this time the Emperor will not refuse."

SOME GERMAN PEOPLE VEXED Because of the Sub to Kruger, But Official Circles Generally Approve of It.

Berlin, Dec. 3.—The Government's curt and decisive intimation that Emperor William would not be able to receive Mr. Kruger has created a profound impression throughout Germany. What may be called the anti-British section of the press does not conceal its annoyance, and the moderate Anglophobe organs with difficulty refrain from the utterance of intemperate denials.

FITZGERALD MAKES A MOVE To Commit the United States Congress to Support of Paul Kruger's Cause.

Washington, Dec. 3.—A resolution in behalf of Paul Kruger was introduced in the House today by Representative Fitzgerald of Massachusetts. It reads: "Resolved, That the efforts of Paul Kruger to secure peace between the Republics be continued."
