FRUIT INSTITUTE

Under the auspices of the Elgin branch of the department of Agriculture a special fruit institute was beld at Port Burwell on Tuesday Dec. 19th. Mr. Jas. E. Johnson of Simcoe, and Mr. F. M. Clement of Dutton, were the speakers of the day,

During the afternoon session, Mr, Clement addressed the meeting on the selection and planting of nursery stock. He advocates the planting of first-class medium sized one-year-old whips and low for commercial orchards.

Mr. Johnson's afternoon subject was 'Orchard Management," cultivation and spraying were dealt with in detail and the speaker made it plain that no half measures will ever lead to success. Thoroughness is essential in all orchard work. Thinning of the growing fruit was described as an Dawes, J. C. Blake, P. Andrews, P. investment paying as high as 500 per cent profits in more fruit of high quality and as a factor in producing annua

In the evening session Mr. Johnson spoke of co.operation and business methods on orcharding, giving m ny valuable hints for the beginners in cooperative work.

The working of the Norfolk associa tion were described and commented on. Mr. Johnson is of the opinion that the first and most important work of the apple association should be that of obtaining and spreading knowledge of proper methods in orchard work, and that following this educational work successful organization and co-operation may be accomplished. Members of an association, to co-operate successfully should exhibit confidence, loyalty, self control and mutual helpfullness.

There was some discussion as to suitable varieties for planting in Elgin county and members were advised to plant most largely of "Spys" and "Baldwins." Mr. Johnson expressed the opinion that the "Baldwin" apple has made more money for the grower than any other variety. For earlier varieties he recommends Snow, McIntosh, and Grimes Golden.
