### Mr. Moody Gets Emphatic.

He Pays His Respects to the Horse  
Show Visitors.

Declares That They Might Do Better Than  
to "Show Off"—A Good Catholic  
Better Than a Bad Protestant.  
Says the Evangelist.

New York, Nov. 19.—A feature of the evangelistic service at Cooper Union was the presence of a very large number of young persons. Another was the pronouncement of Mr. Moody against "mission churches" and his attack on the women who had been "showing off" at the recent horse show. Mr. Moody opened the service with singing, having returned from Philadelphia where he had inaugurated a revival on Monday night. All joined in the hymn, "Moments by Moments."

Mr. Moody continued his series of sermons on "The Holy Spirit." Beginning his discourse, he said to his friends, "A man who was here yesterday has written a letter asking if the report appearing in a newspaper to the effect that I received \$100 last week for conducting these services was true, and whether I was not to receive \$1,000 for conducting them this week. I wish it were true. I would then divide it among the poor. But, unfortunately, it is not true. The Rev. Mr. Dixon, who possibly has the money, and perhaps he is just waiting for an opportunity to give it to me, but I do not think I will meet with so pleasant a surprise. If I get money enough to pay the rent of this hall I will be very glad. We did not get enough at the offertory yesterday. 'Riches are not to be despised, but they are to be used properly.' The Scriptures declare that a man who does not provide for his wife is worse than an infidel. If I should die tomorrow it would be necessary to raise a subscription to bury me. Since I left the world 40 years ago to serve the Lord I have worked hard, and I say to you all: Get wealth, get it honestly. If you have that, your reputation will take care of itself. My correspondent need not therefore read his garments."

The evangelist went on to attack "Mission Churches." "It might not be a misfortune," said he, "if the churches were swept away. We could then begin anew with more of the Holy Spirit in our midst. A half-drunken man came to me yesterday and said that his wife was a Roman Catholic, and he wished to have her straightened out. I told him he needed to be straightened out himself. It is better to be a good Roman Catholic than a drunken Protestant. What say you, my friends?"

The response "Right!" was heard in several parts of the hall. Mr. Moody then said that the Christians at all events make no distinction between rich and poor—they have no mission church all over the world. Referring to the wealthy women of the world, he said: "I don't believe in mission churches. I don't endorse the work of Fifth avenue people for the conversion of the world. The Fifth avenue people are as much in need of conversion as those on the east side. I want to take care of the mission church all over the world."

#### UNDER WHICH KING?

Proceedings of the Knights of Labor—  
Nice Question for a Union to Decide.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 20.—The only business of importance to the general public in the Knights of Labor general assembly yesterday was the adoption of the recommendation of the General Secretary Hayes that the National Brewers' Union, No. 35, should be expelled from the Knights of Labor, and that no man can become a member of the Knights of Labor whose first allegiance is to another order.

The Federation of Labor, however, in the past has been a union of all labor, and it is claimed this will compel the Brewers' Union to at once desert the Knights of Labor and affiliate with the Federation.

#### WHITEFISH FOR LAKE ERIE

Large Quantity of Eggs to be Put in the  
Lake Next Spring.

An Erie, Pa., dispatch says: The superintendent of the Erie whitefish hatchery has sent a keeper, Harry Douglass, to the upper end of Lake Erie for whitefish spawn. Douglass usually goes to Port Clinton and thence across to North Bass island. At the latter place are extensive whitefish catches at this season of the year. The superintendent of the hatchery, the deep waters down through the middle of Lake Erie, and return to the shore at Erie, where they are spawned. The fish are taken in pond-nets there and are alive when removed from their environments. The eggs are then fertilized by the milk, which is stripped from the male fish. The eggs and milk from the live fish are 50 per cent better than what is taken from the whitefish which have been caught in gill-nets, for the reason that the fish are dead when taken from the gill-nets. Mr. Douglass will ship 200,000 eggs to Erie for the spring hatching. The Erie hatchery has hatched about 200,000 whitefish fry since the State established the plant.

#### 7,000 HANDS AFFECTED.

Big Carpet Mills to Close Down—Miners' Strike in Prospect.

New York, Nov. 20.—It is announced that the tapestry mills of the Alexander Smith's Son Carpet Company, in Yonkers, shut down until January or later. It is announced that probably the other mills of this company would do likewise within the next two weeks. This will throw 7,000 hands out of employment.

Monongahela, Pa., Nov. 20.—The Monongahela River miners demand the restoration of the old rate of \$2.86 per 100 bushels in all the river mines except in the fourth pool, where the old rate of \$2.15 is demanded. Should the operators refuse to restore the old rate a general strike will be ordered.

#### NORTHWEST WHEAT.

Winnipeg, Nov. 20.—Wheat declined at Fort William, Man., on Wednesday, the price quoted being 73 1/2c. Now that navigation is about to close, there is more anxiety to sell, and this naturally adds to the weakness.

#### CUT HER THROAT WITH GLASS.

Corning, N. Y., Nov. 19.—At Benton Center last night, Thomas Chrysler committed suicide in a peculiar manner. She locked herself in the parlor, her home, took down a picture from the wall, broke the glass, and used it to sever the jugular vein and arteries of her arm. She was subject to temporary insanity.

here, and all of these have been placed in Lake Erie. In the meantime the State fish commissioners have also hatched out annually about 3,000,000 yellow pike, or wall-eyed pike, which have been distributed among the streams and lakes in the State. The whitefish are hatched the winter, and are deposited in the lake in March; the pike hatch in two weeks, and are put into the streams in April. The Corry and Allentown hatcheries have 200,000 each of brook, hybrid, brown and lake trout, in the trays. The game fish, such as trout, are hatched in trays, and whitefish, pike and pickerel in jars. The outlook for next year's hatchings is good.

### Weyler Whipped.

Cubans Win One of the Most  
Important Battles of the War.

Alleged Victory of the Spanish Forces  
at Santa Cruz and Agrat.

Tampa, Fla., Nov. 20.—Cuban leaders here have received information that the insurgents have just won a conflict with Weyler, one of the most important battles fought on the island during the war. The battle was at Pinar del Rio, but no details are given. Key West, Fla., Nov. 19.—Passengers by the steamer from Havana, which arrived very late, report that Gen. Luque has been wounded in Pinar del Rio.

A report is current in Havana that Weyler will return at once to the city. Spanish merchants and others are very impatient with the report. Madrid, Nov. 20.—An official dispatch received here from Manila says that the insurgents have been defeated in engagements with the Spanish troops at Santa Cruz and Agrat, the enemy losing 500 killed, and the Government loss being slight.

#### SHOT HIS BROTHER—THE OLD STORY.

Morris, Mich., Nov. 20.—Arthur Colburn, a 7-year-old son of Albert Colburn, living two miles from this village, accidentally shot and killed his 13-year-old brother James, while playing with a shotgun. A loaded gun had been left standing within easy reach, and the young boy playfully threatened his brother if he did not hurry to school.
