BASEBALL.

The double-header at Tecumseh Park yesterday afternoon resulted disastrously for the Maple Leafs. In the first game they barely escaped a shut-out, and were downed after a hard fight for the second game. Manager Black tried three pitchers, and finally got into the game himself in his efforts to break even with the home team. Umpire McKeever made his first appearance here, and did good work.

Damoth was hit hard by the Londoners. Four times the ball was sent over the bicycle track near the right or left foul line. On three of these occasions the London batter reached third base, and once the redoubtable captain completed the circuit. Seiver pitched a great game. He had speed to burn, and a jerky shoot that was very deceptive. Or the eight strike-outs to his credit, three were contributed by Tibald, who was at bat only three times. In the nine innings none of the Leafs were at bat more than four times, the side being retired in one, two, three order on a home run. McFadden's triple brought in the first run. Carey's error allowed Lohman to score in the second inning. The third run was Pete's homer.
