MR. CHURCHILL'S LETTER.

Mr. Winston Churchill's letter, addressed to Mr. Hamar Greenwood, was Intended for public consumption in Canada. It purports to describe the attitude of the present-day British Liberalism toward Imperial problems, and is designed to clear up misconceptions which have been industriously fostered by the opponents of the Liberal party. It is quite true, as Mr. Churchill states, that "the symbols and apparatus of Imperial administration" have been peculiarly associated with the Conservative party in recent years. This is largely because that party has had almost a monopoly of office in the period in which the imperial idea has been growing, and taking definite shape. But the impartial student of history will not fall into the error of thinking that British Liberalism and Imperialism have been essentially in conflict. Mr.

Churchill states the case admirably: "And what, I should like to know, has the British Empire to fear from Liberal principles? It is one of the oddest things in modern history that there should be any question of this point. It is to Liberal social principles, carried in some ways to far more logical extremes than in this old country, that Canada and Australia and New Zealand ascribe no little share of their progress and prosperity. It is upon Liberal principles of tolerance and trust in racial matters, of freedem and an equality in religlous matters, that they built their

own internal peace. It is by Liberal imperial principles of colonial autonomy, of a lofty humanity, and, above all, of a peaceful foreign policy, tha the structural cohesion of the British Empire has alone been achieved and will alone be maintained."

London, Sept. 7. - The Countess of Warwick appeared as a prophetess today at the session of the Trades Union Congress at Liverpool. Wearing a big Gainsborough hat covered with a mass of black ostrich feathers and a handsome black and white costume, she told the delegates that she was persecuted by the aristocracy for her adhesion to the cause of socialism. Then, stretching out her arms, which were mmaculately gloved with white kid, she dramatically exclaimed:

"Before long the storm will burst. There will be a social revolution, and n a social revolution I will be more iseful than now. Socialism is the only hope of the workers."

Despite the undoubted sincerity of he countess, there is a marked diverrence between the Socialists and the Laborites regarding her championship of the cause. Many think that the presence of a wealthy, richly-gowned aristocrat on their platforms must weaken the movement. They express contempt for her protestations of earnestness.
