MISSING LIST IS BIG. Montreal, Aug. 18 .- Passengers on a C. P. R. train who passed near the scene of the disaster placed the number of dead from the first explosion at 20. They said the missing list is big, because everybody in the factory rushed into the open country when the first explosion occurred and had not returned when their train left for Montreal.

DRAGON VILLAGE ABLAZE.

The extent of the explosion may be judged by the fact that two farm houses, over a mile from the plant, were destroyed.

At noon the village of Dragon was blazing, and it looked as if it would be totally destroyed.

At the local office of Curtis & Harvey, it was stated that the cause of the explosion, which apparently set fire to a portion of the plant, was not known. It was thought that not more than 300 would be working in the section of the factory affected, and that probably many of these would have time to escape.

FIRE RAPIDLY SPREADS.
