WOMEN WILL SERVE AS ENGINE CLEANERS AT C. P. R. YARDS

The Government Employment Bureau Has Already Secured Four.

A demand for women in the more strenuous branches of labor is already evident. This was exemplified here on Monday when the C. P. R. made application to the Government employment bureau for five women engine cleaners, agreeing to pay 24 cents an hour for their work. This work has never before been done by women in Canada, but the C. P. R. is confident that they will be successful at it, as such work has been carried on almost exclusively by women in European countries since the war began.

That women are willing to venture out into these new and unexplored fields of labor is evident by the fact that already Miss MacRobert of the employment bureau has been able to secure four such women, and hopes shortly to secure the fifth.

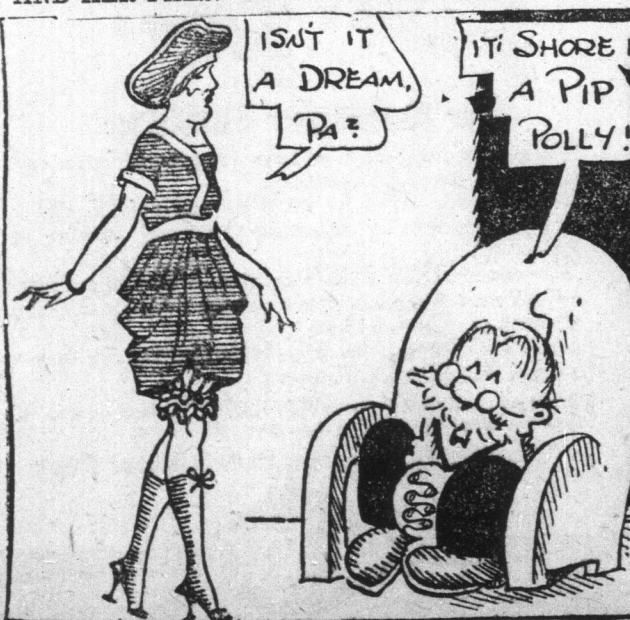
