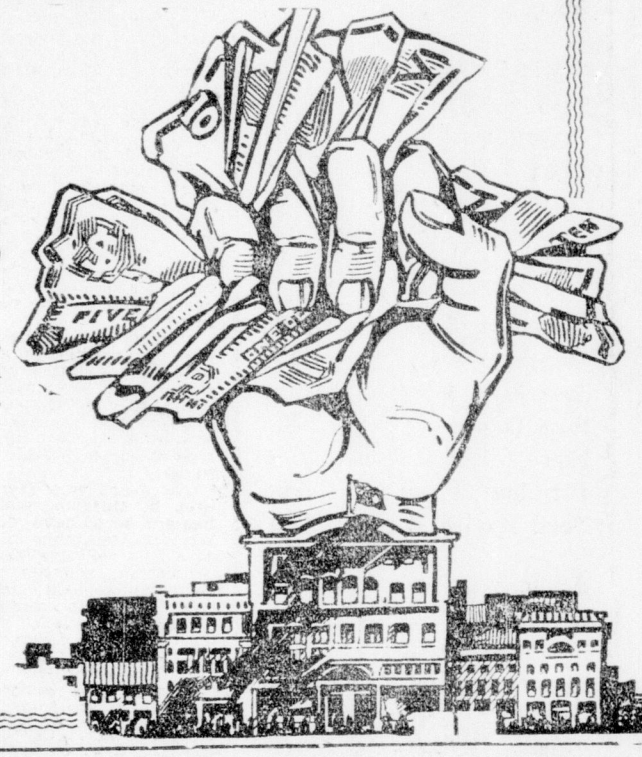

## Farms Wanted for Soldier Settlers

Powers are proposed to be granted at the approaching session of Parliament to The Soldier Settlement Board of Canada to purchase lands to be resold to qualified returned soldiers settling on land. In the case of undeveloped lands the Board will be granted powers of forced purchase at prices judicially determined.

To enable soldiers to locate in any district in Ontario that they wish, the Advisory Board for the Province of Ontario desire to have filed with them a full description and lowest cash prices on a small number of select farms in each district of the Province, available for purchase.

The public are hereby informed that this land is for returned soldiers, and no tenders to sell are requested except for land of good quality and location, and reasonable value, making possible the success of the soldier as a farmer. The purchase price in all cases will be fixed by the Board after the land has been inspected and valued.

The information received will be treated as confidential. No commission will be charged or paid. No offer to sell will be binding on the person offering unless a sale is effected, and no obligation will be on the Board to accept any offer.

If application from a returned soldier be received for a farm listed with the Board, a valuation for such farm may be at once made by the Board and, if approved, negotiations may be entered into for the purchase and sale thereof. An approved list is desired for each district of Ontario.

## 10 MINISTERS OUT OF 23 TO SIT IN HOUSE

Premier Borden Will Pop In For Brief Spell.

IS ON THE ANXIOUS SEAT

Even Interest of Russian Bolsheviks Will Have To Be Put Aside.

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—Sir Robert Borden, it is said, is coming back home. No particular reason is advanced for his coming, and it would appear that his presence at the peace conference is quite as necessary now as it was on any past occasion.

That he is coming, however, in response to S.O.S. calls which have been buzzing across the Atlantic ever since his colleagues left behind in Ottawa, after holding out the session for eight solid months, were finally in desperation, forced to announce the date for reopening at the twentieth of the present month—nine months after the last prorogation—is a matter of general knowledge at Ottawa.

"Sister Anne, Sister Anne, do you see anybody coming?" would appear to have been the burden of the song of Sir Thomas White, acting prime minister, and his little handful of devoted colleagues as they looked toward the east, where far out of their sight the waves of the Atlantic broke and the big ships came in at Halifax.

News that Sir Robert had decided that the Bolsheviks in Russia were more worthy of his consideration than those in his own party and in Canada generally, and that he was to get sail for Prince's Islands in the Sea of Mar-mora, there to endeavor to bring harmony and union out of chaos in a country vaster by far than his own, brought despair to their hearts, since the mission might be calculated to delay his return for months.

However, for some reason Sir Robert has apparently decided that the affairs of the Bolsheviks must wait because of the importance of the men he has left behind to run Canada. If his present reported intention to return does not slip up before the ship sails the premier will be here to counsel the shelving of controversial issues for the coming session.

Gaps in Ministry.

In the meantime the question arises as to who of the Government of 25 will guide the ship of state through the second session of the thirteenth (unlucky?) Parliament of Canada. There are five ministers overseas, including the premier, and three are heads, respectively, of the important departments of justice, customs, and trade and commerce. Sir Edward Kemp is still overseas minister of militia. Then Hon. C. C. Balfour, minister of marine and fisheries, is still very ill in Montreal, and will not be here for the opening of the session. Hon. Frank Cochrane has been acting for some time, and in any case has no portfolio.

Apart from these partial or total absentees, three holders of important portfolios have no seat in the Commons and cannot be present there when their own estimates are up for consideration. They are: Sir James Lougheed, minister of civil re-establishment; Hon.

Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, and Hon. P. E. Blondin, postmaster-general, defeated at the last election in two different seats.

There are left, then, to look after the country's affairs in the House: Sir Thomas White, Hon. C. W. Rowell, Hon. Dr. Reid, Hon. F. B. Carroll, Hon. J. A. Calder, Hon. T. A. Crerar, Hon. C. S. Mewburn, Hon. Martin Burrell, Hon. Arthur Meighen and Hon. A. K. MacLean—10 in all out of 23. Assuredly, the country is safe.

THIRD DIVISION REACHES ENGLAND THIS WEEK

LONDON, Feb. 11.—(Canadian Associated Press).—The entire Third Canadian Division will be in England this week, the first units embarking for Canada at the beginning of March. Bransford Camp will be cleared of other troops, which will be moved to Ripon in Yorkshire. All the men of the third division arriving in England will receive eight days' leave. Willey Camp is being reserved for other divisions now in France.

EDITOR AND SOLDIER IS GIVEN GOVERNMENT SIT

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—C. W. Cavers has been appointed director of information of the soldier settlement board department of the interior.

Mr. Cavers is a returned soldier, who, while serving with the 25th New Brunswick Battalion in France, was gassed. He was for some years editor of the Toronto Sunday World.

## TWO MORE CHARGES ARE HEARD AGAINST WEBER OF NEUSTADT

Traveler Told Him To Go To Warmer Climate With Business.

OWEN SOUND, Feb. 11.—Two more charges against Joe Weber, reeve of Neustadt, were heard before the police magistrate here today, and the accused was set up for trial on these as in the former charges. These charges were based on a letter to Maxwell, Limited, in which the aid of this company was asked to secure the exemption of Weber's son, and a verbal request to a traveler named Bayne, both to Maxwell, Limited, and to Bayne, Weber. It is alleged, threatened to refuse to give them any more business unless they signed the petition.

Bayne plainly told the Webers to go to hell with their business.

Weber was also charged with uttering seditious language to a traveler, Arthur Mutton of St. Marys, in which he was alleged to have stated that "The British were licked, and they knew it, and before either of his sons would go, they would die in the hard-ware store." The prosecution based its case on Mutton's evidence, and the defence, for the first time, in any of the cases, presented evidence. This case was not concluded, and will be heard again tomorrow morning.
