Saving 498 Apple Trees!

"Where there's a will there's a way." Two intelligent young farmerettes last year found out the way to do "bridge-grafting" and applied the remedy with almost 100 per cent success. One of the two, a well-known London girl, Miss Margaret McCrimmon, daughter of Lieut.-Col. W. A. McCrimmon, Hayman Court, told the story one day which has furnished the data for the accompanying article. She is very happy over the fact that the success of herself and friend just missed being 100 per cent. The photograph reproduced on this page shows Miss McCrimmon engaged in bridge-grafting on a fine old apple tree, three feet in diameter, which required the operation in order to save its life.

"Bridge-grafting is real hard, disagreeable work, but it is such a satisfaction," said the former farmerette, as she showed one afternoon a collection of snapshots taken last spring and summer in an Ontario orchard, not far from Owen Sound, an orchard which she and a friend literally saved for the owner.

"How did we learn to be bridge-grafting experts?" she continued with laughter in her eyes and quivering around the corners of her mouth. "We didn't learn at all. We just did it. You see, early in the spring of 1918, while we were living in Toronto, and when there was such an insistent demand for girls to take the place of men in farm work, my friend and I registered at the women's farm work department of the Government Employment Bureau. It wasn't long till we were called to go up north to do bridge-grafting in an orchard in which the field mice had done their best to destroy 500 trees by 'girdling' them, or eating circles of bark right around the trees. Unless saved by bridge-grafting, the trees would die.

FUTURE STAKED ON THE ORCHARD. "Apart from the loss of food involved in a year like last year, and the great permanent loss of the fruit trees, the worst of it was that the owner of the farm had staked his whole future on the trees of that year's orchard.

"We protested that we didn't know anything about bridge-grafting or any other grafting. The reply was that

"I was recommended as an expert, and finally went on my own terms. When I saw the big trees, and particularly the one shown in the picture, I was simply appalled. But I went to work, and the farmer and his wife helped me, and we got through in record time. I really got a lot of pleasure out of the second experience.

"A year ago last spring, on the fruit farm up north, we used to carry around with us as a part of our kit bridge-grafting an old box with a coal oil stove in it, on which to soften

the wax. One fine day we had a fire. The wax boiled over and the box caught fire, and that was the end of our oil stove.

"We couldn't do anything but laugh. Fortunately, we just had three more trees to do, but it took ever so much longer, because we had to run into the house every little while to melt the wax, and it was almost hard by the time we got back to the tree again.

NEGLECT NOW—FAMINE LATER. "As I go through the country on the train now it makes me ache to get at some of the orchards that are simply going to waste through lack of pruning, grafting and general neglect. In addition to neglecting the old orchards, the Ontario farmers seem to be neglecting to plant out new orchards, and this means that in time, unless something is done, Ontario apples will be almost a thing of the past.

"When you consider the splendid results of grafting, bridge-grafting, and pruning orchards, it seems amazing that more farmers do not take care of the money-making asset which so many of them have in orchards on their farms!"

STILL RENDERING NATIONAL SERVICE. While Miss McCrimmon is not engaged this year in helping to increase the food supply through taking care of orchards, she is giving her time to very important public welfare work. When a call came to her from Toronto, where she lived during the greater part of the war years, to assist at a children's fresh air camp on the shores of Lake Simcoe, she cheerfully accepted the opportunity for service, and she is now up there, helping to entertain and keep out of mischief and danger youngsters who, but for the fresh air camp, would never know the joy of such an outing.

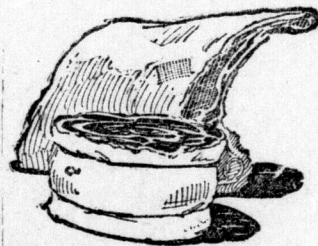

VETERANS ASK GOVT. FOR \$1,000 BONUS FOR EVERY SOLDIER

Vancouver, B. C., July 3.—After an all-day discussion, the Great War Veterans' Association, in session here last night, adopted a resolution calling

on the Government to grant bonuses to all Canadians who served in the active military service or their dependents. The resolution was a compromise on the much-discussed Calgary resolution, and differed from that passed at the Calgary convention in some points.

The resolution is applicable also to those residents of Canada prior to August, 1914, who served in imperial units and who are now or may be at some future time domiciled in Canada.

What They Ask. The resolution says: And he it further resolved that after careful thought and full consideration, we are of the opinion that such a system of bonus payments

should provide at least \$1,000 to every member of the forces who served in Canada, with an additional \$500 to those who served overseas, and a further additional \$500 to those serving in the actual theatre of war, or the granting of a cash bonus approximating those amounts upon an equality basis, the distribution thereof to be determined by a joint parliamentary and G. W. V. A. commission.

And that this bonus should be in addition to any gratuity or pension for disability resulting from services, and that in case of members of the expeditionary forces whose death occurred either while in the service or after dis-

charge therefrom, such bonus shall be paid to their dependents; all of the benefits contained in this resolution shall apply to those resident in Canada prior to August 4, 1914, who served in the imperial forces and are now, or may be at any future date, domiciled in Canada.

WHALEN PASTOR ARRIVES. WHALEN, July 3.—Rev. Mr. Finlay, who has just finished a four-year term at Centralia, of which Whalen Church forms a part, left Wednesday for his new charge at Charing Cross, and the new pastor, Rev. Mr. Sinclair of Homerville, has moved into the parsonage.

"No, the grafts do not stand out exactly like teapot handles. If they did, they would soon get torn off. They are laid on closely to the tree as possible. The idea is to connect up the sap from below the girdle with the upper part of the tree.

GRAFT WITHOUT GLOVES! "There is another disagreeable feature. You have to work without gloves. We tried rubber gloves and every other kind, but the operation is such a delicate one you can't manage with gloves. You have to work with a penknife, and the cuts must be as fine as possible. The smaller the incision the better.

"After the incisions are made and the ends of the grafts inserted, then the cavity is stuffed with wax. We inserted the grafts every four or five inches. Later we read that the grafts should be placed an inch and a half apart. We wouldn't have been able to finish in a year if that had been the case. Our grafting proved most satisfactory.

ONLY TWO OUT OF 500 DIED. "I think, out of 500 trees, only two died.

The farmer worked with us the first few days, then he became satisfied that we knew our business, and left us to
