Best Reports in History Are Presented to Baptists at Their Annual Meeting

Rev. Thomas Bingham of Parkehill Is Elected President of the Pastors' Association—Splendid Work Is Being Done in the Mission Fields.

A record attendance, the best reports in the history of the Baptist Mission Bands and Circles of Middlesex and Lambton Counties and the best financial standing in many years were features of the 47th annual meeting of the association, which opened yesterday in Adelaide Street Baptist Church.

Mrs. R. McKay, president of Women's Circles and Bands, greeted the large gathering to the annual convention.

In a brief but stirring address Mrs. McKay complimented the women on the splendid work accomplished during the past year. She said the cry from foreign mission fields had been great; also workers in the home field were urgently needed, and through efforts of the Middlesex and Lambton Mission Circles and Bands missionaries had been equipped and sent out.

Mission Reports.

A digest of Circles and Mission Bands was given by Mrs. J. Baldwin of this

city, who appealed for still greater activities in the circles and bands. She said there could be made much more interesting and larger numbers would attend if the meetings were made worth while.

Mrs. A. F. Matthews of Denfield, speaking on the missionary leaflets, asked that the Link and Visitor, two missionary papers, be subscribed to more generally.

She advocated that people, as many of the stories were intensely interesting for young and old people, she suggested ways in which the meetings of the circles and bands might be made more interesting.

G. Taylor of Sarnia also gave an interesting talk on "The Circle and its Problems."

Mrs. J. S. Haverstock conducted the "Quiet Hour."

A very entertaining missionary dialogue was given by children from some of the local Mission Bands, representing the virtues of the Christian and the

various heathen lands.

The New Officers.

The officers elected for the coming year were: President, Mrs. N. Mills;

London; vice-president, Mrs. (Rev.) L. S. Haverstock; directors, Mrs. J. Baldwin, Mount Brydges; and Miss Pickett of London was re-elected secretary.

The financial statement for the year showed that \$1,176.60 had been raised for home missions and \$1,505.38 for foreign missions.

The total amount raised by mission circles \$2,681.97. Mission bands raised a total of \$142.40.

Mrs. C. J. Holman, speaking at the evening session on "Work of the Baptist Women's Missionary Society," referred to the number of home missionaries sent to Quebec and the Northwest.

"The greater number of these home missionaries are sent to Quebec and the Northwest," she said. "Roman Catholicism rules in Quebec, and we as Baptists can approach them as Protestants can."

"Why do I say that the Baptists are not Protestants? Protestants are those who were at one time within the Catholic Church, but have withdrawn; but Baptists were always Baptists. Catholics in Quebec are illiterate, for the reason that they are kept in ignorance of the Bible. A Bible is not found in a Catholic home and the Catholics are not found in favor of public schools."

Over 40 Years.

Mrs. Holman stated that the Baptist Foreign Missionary Society had been organized for over 40 years, and in that time had sent out to foreign lands 97 missionaries.

"In Toronto there are 35 Baptist Churches and eight missions, but from Toronto to Montreal, the Baptist Churches are fewer, and in some towns there are no Baptist Churches at all," said Mrs. Holman.

"But if the work of Baptists compare well every year with this year it will not be long before there is a Baptist Church in every town and city from coast to coast."

TILLSONBURG CITIZENS CARRY HIGHER PRICE GAS BYLAW BY 419

Company Undertakes to Divert Supply From Other Towns.

TILLSONBURG, June 8.—The electors today voted by a majority of 419 to allow the Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited, to increase its rates from 35 cents per 1,000 feet to 45 cents the first year, and 50 cents per 1,000 feet for the remainder of the franchise.

In return the company agrees to spend \$50,000 in the vicinity of Tillsonburg in the next five years in the digging of new wells and laying of adequate pipe lines to assure a first-class gas service to its consumers and to divert a quantity of gas to Tillsonburg which was formerly supplied to other towns equal to 30 per cent of the total amount used here last winter. They will drill three new wells the present year and will be in a position to encourage drilling by independent producers by being able to offer them an increased price for their product.
