

There were disturbances at Limerick. riving the day and monthly men an increase estimated at from 35 to 72 following the shooting of a policeman. which the police charge was done by a civilian. Others, however, declare the shooting was accidental. Civilians allege that the subsequent events, including the burning of several buildings, were part of the police reprisals camdemands made by the miners, including the 10 cents per ton asked for pick and machine mining.

FORMER LEGISLATOR HELD AT MONTREAL ON THREE CHARGES

MONTREAL, Aug. 16.—Arthur Ecrement, former member of Parliament and notary of the city of Montreal, appeared this morning before Judge Cushion in the arraignment court on three charges of securing money under false pretences, the complaint being laid by O. Patinaude of 1112 St. Andre street. The accused was arrested at Atholstan, a small town near the American border, where he had been recorded by the United States immigration authorities, under instructions from the department of labor in Washington, who had ordered Ecrement to be deported as an undesirable citizen. The prisoner pleaded not guilty to the charges against him. The inquiry on all the charges was set for 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.


