DETROIT, March 19.-Referring to the probability that the Canadian tariff regulations may be amended so as give greater protection to Caradian shipbuilders, by imposing a duty on repairs made on Canadian vesels in United States ports, which, under the pre-

sent regulations cannot be collected by the Ca au an customs department, it is recalled that there is but one modern drydock on the Canadian side of the lakes, that is at Collingwood, which is considered an out of the way place, and this dock can take care of but one kind of work at a time, causing a delay to waiting vessels that would be intolerable to the owners.
