LOSS WAS A MISFORTUNE
D. C. Clinch of St. John Didn't Misappropriate the Funds of an English Client.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 10.—The jury brought in a verdict of acquittal in the criminal action for misappropriation of \$9000 brought against D. C. Clinch, a prominent local broker, on the information of Capt. George Morrissey of Wornmouth, England.

J. B. M. Baxter appeared for defendant and Attorney-General Hazen for the crown.

After hearing the argument of counsel, Judge McLeod told the jury to bring in a verdict of acquittal, saying that while it was regrettable that Capt. Morrissey had lost so much money, the loss was one of the misfortunes of business.

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Barrie Prisoner Gets Out of Jail

Traps One Guard and Assaults Governor—Captured at Allendale Few Hours Later.

Barrie, Sept. 10.—J. A. Cannon, a smartly dressed young man, arrested here for cashing worthless cheques, made a daring attempt to escape, and almost succeeded.

When Turnkey Joseph Somerville went to the south upstairs corridor to remove the breakfast dishes, Cannon jumped past the guard into the hospital ward, closing and fastening the corridor door behind him. With the turnkey safely disposed of, he opened the hospital door, which, as it happened, had been left unlocked, contrary to orders, and encountered Gov. Sissons in a narrow hall at the head of the winding stairs. Here a rough and tumble struggle took place, the governor, notwithstanding his advanced age, putting up a determined fight.

The younger man, however, was overpowered with mercy. After knocking him down by a blow on the head, he kicked and otherwise abused him, while on the stone floor. Cannon then jumped over a banister and landed on the ground floor. An aged but trusted prisoner named Andrew Ruthenford was brushed aside with scant ceremony. Cannon then reached the open air without further difficulty.

He was captured at Allendale about six hours later, after having had a shave in the meantime.
