Government Crop Report Not Material to Prices

Chicago Options Unsteady but Firmer for Wheat After Report Was Received—Cables Steady.

World Events. Thursday Evening. July 8. Liverpool wheat futures closed unchanged to 1/4 higher; corn 1/4 lower. Chicago July wheat closed 1/4 higher; corn 1/4 higher, and oats 1/4 higher; Winnipeg July wheat closed 1/4 lower; oats 1/4 higher. Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat 4, contract none; corn 89, contract 84; oats 1, contract 100. Winnipeg car lots of wheat to-day 93, against 87 this day last year. Northwest car lots to-day 87; last year 85.

Government Crop Report.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The average condition of the crop of corn July 1 was 83 per cent. of normal, against 81 1/2 per cent. for the same date last year. Spring wheat 82, against 81 1/2; winter wheat 84, against 83 1/2; spring wheat 92, against 91 1/2; spring and winter combined 84 1/2, against 83 1/2; rye 83, against 82 1/2; barley 82, against 81 1/2; and oats 84, against 83 1/2. Corn planted 100,000,000 bushels; wheat 100,000,000 bushels; rye 10,000,000 bushels; and oats 10,000,000 bushels.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce were 15 loads of hay and 100 bushels of grain. Oats—One hundred bushels sold at \$1.15 per bushel. Hay—Fifteen loads sold at \$12 to \$15 per ton for old, and \$8.50 per ton for one load of new.

114 CARS AT CITY YARD QUALITY OF CATTLE FAIR

Trade Slow—Market Dull—Prices 30c to 50c Cwt. Lower—Hogs \$8.20 Cwt.

The railroads reported 114 carloads of live stock for Wednesday, and Thursday, consisting of 1254 cattle, 270 hogs, 110 sheep and lambs, and 49 calves. The quality of cattle generally was not as good as the deliveries for many weeks past, but was to be expected. Trade was slow, with market dull, and prices lower, from 30c to 50c per cwt. Cattle were selling for 30c per cwt. less than was bid for them on Tuesday. One Canadian steer was bid at \$5 per cwt. in the country sold at \$4.80 to-day, and this was one instance out of many of a similar nature.
