The New California Jockey Club's winter meeting for the season of 1909410, which opened Nov. 20' and came to a close June 4, embraced 185 racing days, during which time 59 races, were decided, entailing a total distribution in stakes and purses of \$173,425. This represented a great shrinkage in distribution is compared with the meetings at Oakland prior to the passage of adverse racing legislation in California last year. While there may hor be immediately a full return of the prosperity which formerly marked the colduct of racing on the coast, the indications are that recent court decisions will permit the holding of a meeting next winter that will be more in keeping with the traditions of California racing than the one just ended, and if there should be no further inimical legislation the California meetings probably will eventually regain their oid-time importance. The closing of the meeting recently held found H. G. Bedwell, who raced at Oakland only during a part of the California season, at the head of the list of winning owners, with the respectable total of \$11,425 to his credit, an excellent showing considering the reduced values of the purses raced for. Mr. Bedwell's horses won no less than 6 races during the meeting. Molera & Josephs stand second with 16 races and \$745, while third place goes to J. M. Crane, with 24 races and \$535. The following owners won \$1200 and over during the meeting.
