

PUT ON HIS WORDS

Mr. McInnes Vigorously Replies to the Globe.

WILL STAND TO HIS GUNS

And Fight Monopoly Until the Last Ditch is Reached.

A Brilliant Speech From the Boy Orator in Reply to the Liberal Organ's Criticisms—The Globe's Charge of Front in Regard to Monopolies Shown Up in Trenchant Style—Mr. Foster Gives the Government a Searching in Connection With the Delay of the Tariff Announcements.

Ottawa, April 9.—(Special.)—William Wallace Bruce McInnes, M.P. for Vancouver, is a spunky little chap. After keeping quiet over the flood of Billingsgate which the Toronto Globe has been pouring into him for some days he brought the matter up in the House, and in the opinion of those who heard him more than got over with the Globe. Members of the House of Commons are wholly at a loss to account for the action of the Globe in coming down from his high pinnacle of journalistic ethics and descending to language of which a first-rate western newspaper might be ashamed. Several Liberal members admit that the Globe has made a mistake. True, they did not like to see the spectacle which was afforded in the House this afternoon of a supporter of the Government falling out with the ministerial organ, but they concede that Mr. McInnes' speech was justified, and commended the vigor of his remarks.

As for the Conservatives, it was simply pie for them to hear Mr. McInnes stating the Globe's case. They are not so much as that it appeared his remarks of last Monday in support of a motion attacking for the disavowance of a British Columbia statute did not please the Toronto Globe. "On the contrary," he said, "that paper has taken exception to a word or an expression in some of my statements. The portions of my speech to which they object are as follows: 'Take the attitude of the Globe in this matter. Why, sir, judging from its past you would have supposed that it would be firmly and uniformly for the people in favor of securing to the great masses of the people their rights; that the attitude upon this question of the men who control it would have had a more serious effect of reverence about it. What is the fact? I have no hesitation in saying that from the moment some months ago when they took up this matter with extraordinary suddenness and interest, their attitude was one of deception. They have been beating about the bush month after month, and they have done so in a profession of arguments that have been ingenuously and most invariably unprincipled. Now, after all these months of pretended discussion and their statements, they finally pretend to come to the conclusion that they are a falsehood, and that they are to be regarded as a scandalous charge upon the floor of Parliament, a charge that they brand as a falsehood and a slander.'"

They have seen fit, Mr. McInnes continued, on account of my using that language, to write and circulate the Globe of April 6 as follows: 'Let him carry his rhetoric to the Victoria if he wishes to manage the city of Victoria. The Globe has heard him and he has heard the Globe to his heart's content. He has perhaps the right to be angry, but he has no right to privilege of Parliament, and we cordially agree that he is an expert at the business.'"

And in the same issue of the same paper yesterday, the 5th it concludes its article in the following language: 'The Globe made an attack upon Mr. McInnes, it was in reply to a scandalous charge upon the floor of Parliament, a charge that they brand as a falsehood and a slander.'"

CANADIAN FAST LINE.

A Contract Signed With the Peterson Company, SO MR. CHAMBERLAIN SAID

In Answer to a Question in the British House of Commons.

But the Contract Will Require the Sanction of the Imperial Government Before Being Effective—Sir Richard Webster Stated for the Government That the Intention of the Powers Regarding a Blockade of Crete Could Not Be Announced Until Belligerent Action Had Been Taken.

London, April 9.—In the House of Commons today the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, answered a question on the subject, announced by a member of the Opposition, Mr. G. H. D. Balfour, regarding the proposed Government House at Ottawa.

On motion of the Attorney-General, the House went into committee and the Attorney-General, Mr. Richard Webster, reported that the Government had agreed to a contract with the Peterson Company for the construction of the new Government House at Ottawa.

At a later stage Mr. Haycock moved the omission of the grant, and the motion was carried by a majority of 10.
