It is of paramount importance to the welfare of our beloved land that the women who have done and given so much for their country should be granted citizens' rights before that time, in order that they may help to make Canada a better place in which their chikiren may grow to manhood their children may grow to manhood and womanhood. The greatest re-sources of a country are its human resources of a country are its human resources. In order best to conserve these, women wish to have a voice in the final vote on prohibition. They wish to help in solving the problem of the returned soldier. They wish to help in reducing the high cost of twing, as they have already done very effectually in other countries and states where they are directly represented. Their own desire is to help—and they believe that their unenfranchised condition is a serious handicap, not only to their own full development, but, partly because of that lack of development, and partly because they have no voice in legislation, a handicap to the welfare of their country. Country.

This was realized in the four western

provinces. In three, a patriotic government enfranchised the women. In the fourth the men of the province sethe fourth the men of the province secured the franchise for their mothers, wives and sisters by referendum, and the soldiers at the front were among the voters. The ladies who deprecate bringing up the franchise question in the absence of our Ontario sons and brothers misinterpret absolutely the spirit of the soldiers. They are fighting for democracy, against the spirit of oppression. They have become imbued with the very spirit of freedom.
