In the domestic branch, of which Miss Duff is head, 33 employers' orders for permanent help were received and 72 casual orders. In the permanent work 27 new applicants registered and 22 former applicants re-registered. Help wanted totalled 43 orders of which 17 were filled as follows: Three sewers, one practical nurse, three domestics, one housekeeper, two chambermaids, three parlor girls and two waitiresses. In the casuals there were 38 registered and 49 renewals, help wanted 42, and 101 days' work were filled.

and just sat on the roadside, waiting for the bombardment to stop so that they could go back and fetch their belongings, but it did not stop that night, so we hastily opened the school and rushed over nearly all our supply of blankets and quilts and gave a meal of cocca and sandwiches. Flavie, the cook, and Meile Berlament, the vicar's sister threw down in the middle of the room a string with a curtain about the size of a large bath towel and on the other side two brancadiers (the brancadiers are, as you know, generally priests or young men studying for the priesthood, and they have done splendid work). We all laughed like children at the scene. I don't think anyone got much sleep that night as the poise of the guns kept up continuously.

"During the day a constant stream of people trekked down our road to the country, taking their belongings in every kind of vehicle from the wheelbarrows and dog-drawn cars to military lorries.
