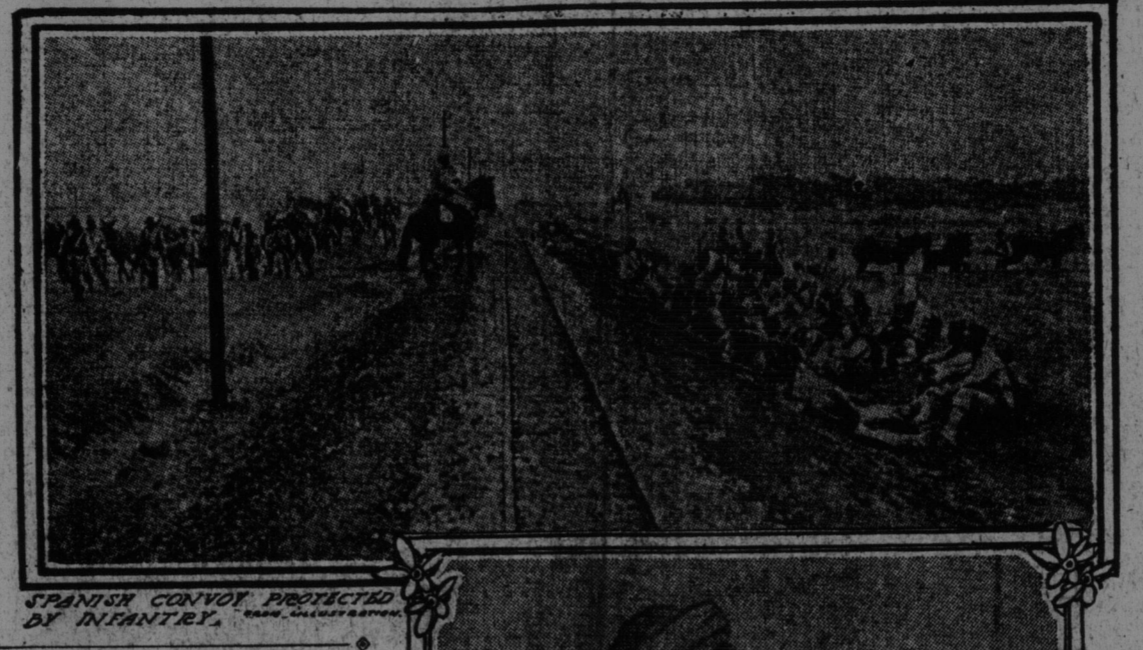

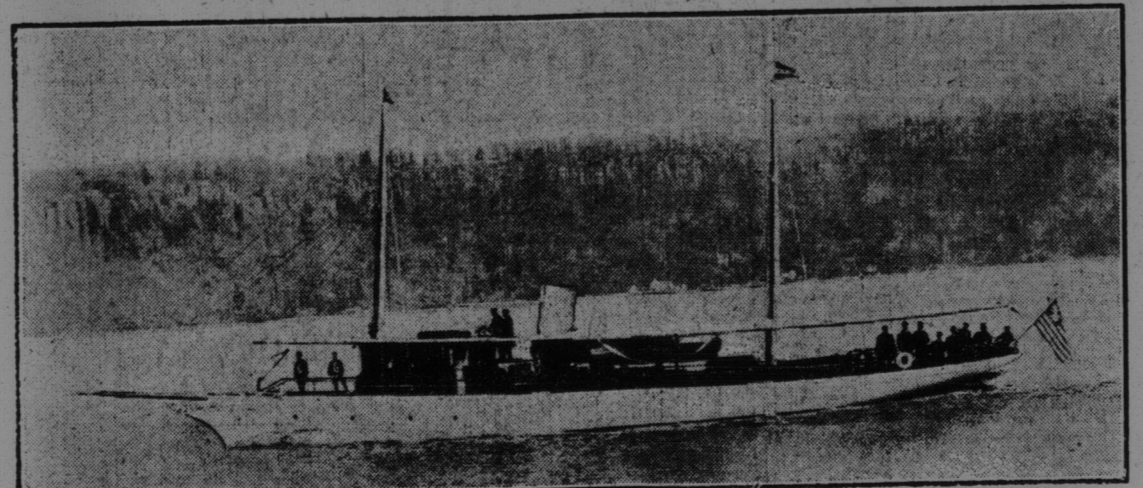

VESSELS WRECKED, COUNTRY DEVASTATED, LIVES LOST

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 13.—A special from Lapaz, Lower California, says: "Lapaz, the oldest settlement of the Californias, has been swept by a destructive storm in and about Old Pueblo. Seven lives are known to have been lost and the shore is strewn with wreckage from ships and boats in the roadstead. In many places the water was four feet deep in the streets. Great suffering exists, especially among the poor people, the majority of whom have lost everything they had. From the country district the news comes slowly, indicating that the devastation was great."
