AS TO RAILROADS

Secretary Root Replies

Here Harriman paused, and turning to Secretary Root, said: "It is often important to a city or county whether we do certain things, whether we develop a territory or leave it dormant; and when we cannot give development a start because of the action of certain people for prejudice, I believe there is soon to be a change of attitude which will soon be felt. The people are coming to a belief in Americanism and that means fair play."
