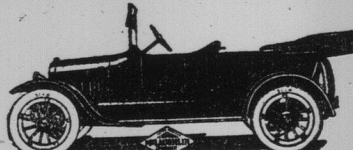

#### BEAVERS WIN

#### LANGWORTHY WINS PROMOTION

Friends of Harry Langworthy of this  
city will be pleased to know that he  
was promoted to be quartermaster-ser-  
geant at Vimy Ridge. Q. M. C. Lang-  
worthy left St. John with a local bat-  
talion in June, 1915, as a private, and  
has been seen in action with Company  
Sergeant-Major Whitehouse, and Pte.  
Percy Till, both who have since been  
killed. Langworthy himself has not yet  
received a scratch. He is "winning his  
spurs" in the genuine Roman fashion.

this spring than ever before. They say  
that everybody talks of increased pro-  
duction but that the scarcity of help is  
a great handicap for some of the farm-  
ers. So greatly disappointed were the  
excursionists who expected to go up  
river on the May Queen yesterday that  
sixty-nine of them rather than to  
river trip, went up on the Oconee to  
Westfield, and returned by the suburban.  
The Oconee brought down a salmon  
and some shad from Craig's Point this  
morning. She also brought a quantity  
of pork and veal and other produce, in-  
cluding some chickens.

#### THE MAN WITH THE HOE

OBSERVES HOLIDAY

By Getting a Blister and a Garden  
—Vegetation Very Backward  
Along the River

The Man With the Hoe set out on  
Wednesday afternoon to find the Happy  
Valley. The Woman also went, and  
also the Children. Of course they went  
up the St. John River. Also, of course,  
they went to Public Landing.

The Oconee had a full passenger list.  
In fact it was like a summer excursion  
party, although the weather was far  
from summer-like. How it did rain be-  
fore the steamer left the wharf, and as  
she proceeded up the river. But she  
ran out of it long before she reached  
the Landing. The water in the river  
is still high, but all the stops were made,  
and at Day's Landing the boat from  
the shore was twice filled with passen-  
gers. At the Landing the wharf was  
easily made, and many passengers went  
ashore.

The Oconee had much freight as well  
as many passengers, and the odor of  
fertilizer went with the amateur gar-  
deners to cheer them on their way. Or-  
dinarily they would sniff at it, but in  
this year of increased production it is  
as the perfume of Araby the Blest.

It will be remembered that the Happy  
Valley of Rassauas was located on a  
lofty plateau, and so the Man with the  
Hoe climbed the Barker Hill. No gar-  
dening could be done that evening, but  
the Woman emptied packing cases and  
cooked supper and made beds, and the  
Children brought in trilliums and dog-  
tooth violets and white violets, and a  
solitary strawberry blossom. Not  
a tree was yet in leaf, but the red buds  
were out on the maples, and all the  
foliage was but waiting for the encou-  
agement of a few sunny days.

Bedtime came with the darkness, but  
the aspect of the weather did not en-  
courage early rising in the morning. It  
was heavily overcast, with a threat of  
rain. Before noon, however, the sun  
came out, and the afternoon was sunny  
and delightful. The ground was ready,  
and hoe and rake and fork and wheel-  
barrow were brought into service. Of  
course the Man tried to assert his au-  
thority, and direct the operations, but  
when a member of the Housewives  
League says a thing she means it. Suffi-  
ce it to say that long before supper  
time there were long rows planted with  
lettuce, beets, carrots, parsnips, beans,  
peas and onions. Also there were bil-  
bers, sunburn, aching muscles and stiff-  
ened joints. But the garden has been  
begun. There are still half a dozen  
kinds of seeds to be planted, but the  
Woman and the Children have had a  
taste of the joy of gardening, and they  
sent the Man to town this morning for  
more seeds.

Who is the Man with the Hoe? There  
are scores of him, and he got more real  
satisfaction, whether at Public Landing  
or any suburban point, out of the 24th  
May than he has experienced for  
years and years.

There were motor boats on the river  
yesterday, and one sailing yacht went  
past the Landing. The familiar tug  
and raft, passed down yesterday. The  
Champlain and Majestic had good pas-  
senger lists upward and the D. J. Purdy  
brought many down. From this time  
forward the river traffic will take on  
new life, especially at week-ends. The  
Oconee brought down a large list this  
morning. She will begin her early Mon-  
day morning trips down a week from  
next Monday.

### NEW PASTOR HERE

Rev. S. B. Culp Arrives to Assume  
Charge of Coburg Street Church

Edrian, Mich. He came to St. John from

In addition to his regular duties as  
a pastor, Mr. Culp has devoted much  
attention to revival work in which he  
has been successful in St. Louis, Detroit  
and other large cities of the states.

SUMMER MONTHS

### SOLDIERS IN COURT

In the police court this morning con-  
siderable time was taken up with the  
charge against two soldiers, Ptes. Ernest  
Alexander and Edgar Butts, for being  
under the influence of liquor and fight-  
ing together in Charlotte street. The re-  
sidence of Policemen Minty and Gibbs  
showed that Butts had been found in an  
alley way in Charlotte street drunk and  
bleeding. Alexander and Butts had been  
seen fighting by Policemen Minty, who  
said that he had been watching the sol-  
diers for some time.

Alexander was called to the stand by  
an officer of the regiment to which the  
soldiers belong. He denied being under  
the influence and said that he was per-  
fectly able to look after himself. Dif-  
ferences arose as to the evidence of the  
police and that of this soldier, especially  
with respect to the time of the arrest.  
Alexander was standing when arrested  
between Alexander and Policeman Gibb.  
The result was that there  
may be a perjury charge against the sol-  
dier. The two soldiers were remanded  
until tomorrow morning.

The officer who appeared for the two  
soldiers, asked the court for another sol-  
dier who, he said, had been in custody  
since last Saturday. The officer said  
that it was only courtesy on the part of  
the police to inform the Battalion to  
which the soldier is attached.

### OBTAINING MONEY BY FALSE PRETENCES CHARGED

The charge of obtaining money under  
false pretences was read to John Jones  
in the police court this morning follow-  
ing his arrest yesterday by Detectives  
Duncan and Briggs. The man did not  
enter a plea and was remanded to jail.  
The police say that the man was acting  
as a legitimate representative of a  
publication up to November, 1916, but  
was then discharged. Following his dis-  
charge, the police say, he continued to  
take subscriptions and received from  
Mrs. B. H. Cochrane, 19 Murray street,  
\$2.16 on March 1, being payment for a  
subscription. Other people, it is said, in  
the same house also gave money, with  
Jones promising to send the publication.  
As copies of the periodical failed to  
arrive he had office was communicated  
with and it was learned that Jones had  
been dismissed. The police were not  
ified and his arrest was the outcome.

Peter Petroff was also remanded on a  
charge of theft of bags from the Atlantic  
Super Grocery.  
As yesterday was a holiday, the city  
court cases were taken up by Magis-  
trate Ritchie this morning.

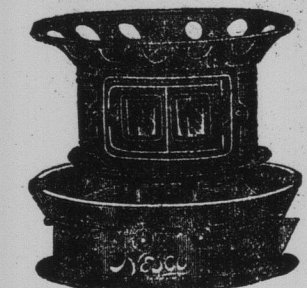
