ASK POPE TO HELP SAVE PERSECUTED BELGIANS
 Rome, via Paris, Nov. 2.—Pope Benedict XIII received letters from Belgian clergymen and members of the church in Belgium, imploring him to aid in saving persons who have been condemned to death or to serve long terms of imprisonment. One letter calculates that sentences aggregating more than 10,000 years of imprisonment have been pronounced since Belgium was occupied by the Germans.

TWO BROTHERS ARE AMONG THE RECRUITS TODAY
Eight Signed Roll of 104th This Morning
Capt. Justin Gallagher of Dental Corps Here—Lieut. Don Skinner Through Recent Heavy Fighting

With eight men signing the roll of the 104th this morning, and many others waiting to be examined, today promises to be satisfactory in recruiting. Twenty-one joined yesterday, though up to noon only eight had registered. The men passed today and accepted included two brothers, Fred and Augustus Gallant of P. E. Island; Charles Cassidy, John Palmer, Walter Samory, St. John; Craig H. Parker, Whitehead, N. B.; Perley Adams, McAdam Junction, N. B.; and George Smith, of Jacques Mines, N. S. Dental Branch.
 Captain Justin Gallagher, of Moncton, senior maritime province officer in the Canadian Army Dental Corps, has taken up his quarters in the armory, where he has established offices preparatory to the arrival of the 52nd from Fort Arthur. Capt. Gallagher has many friends in the city who are congratulating him upon his appointment. He expects to remain here about two months or so before going overseas. He has been at Valcartier Camp with the Corps and the work done there by the dental unit is familiar to all Canadians, for they helped make three thousand volunteers acceptable for service through work on their teeth. It is in connection with such work among members of the 52nd or other military units here, that a detachment of the corps will make their stay in St. John for a time.
