WINNIPEG DEALERS ASK DELAY

Stocks Disposed of; Saskatoon Agents Laud Reduction, Saying It Will Stimulate Business

TORONTO, April 17.—The Dodge Motor Car Company of Canada suspended operations at its Toronto plant today, and more than 400 employes were rendered unemployed for an indefinite period. At the same time the Durant Motor Company of Canada also closed temporarily, affecting about 600 men. Both suspensions were made in order that the companies might decide on future operations.

The Canadian motor car manufacturers will meet, to gether with all other Canadian manufacturers adversely affected by the tariff changes, on April 21, in. this city, to decide what action is to be taken.

NEW YORK, April 17.—Stocks of the Ford Company of Canada continued their toboggan on the curb exchange this morning, the theory of the sellers continuing to be that the proposed reduction of the Canadian tariff rates on automobiles would largely wipe out the advantage of United States companies operating in Canada.
