

MARKS ANXIOUS

Berlin Bankers Believe More Held in U.S. Than in

berlin, Nov. 15—A great many foreigners who possess German paper marks bought at bargain rates in the days of inflation still cling to the hope that the mark some time will come into its own again, judging by the number of letters received here by the commercial representatives of many nations.

"Quite a number of the writers are women, who eagerly inquire from time to time how much longer they must bold the notes before they are redeemed by the German Government.

The paper mark went out of business a year ago this week, when the renten mark came into use. There was then so much of this kind of currency on hand that in numerous instances banks and other institutions turned the marks over to junk dealers by the ton.

Most of these notes, which toward the end of the inflation period, were not worth the paper used in their manufacture, have been destroyed or made up into pasteboard boxes and the like. Rankers here declare they are probably more of the old German marks seattered about the United States than exist today in all Germany itself.


