A few years ago when the Giants were in the thick of a pennant race Larry Doyle, then captain and second baseman of the Giants, broke his leg in a game in New York, and McGraw had nobody to replace Doyle at second in the crisis. In this emergency McGraw finally purchased Bert Niehoff, who the spring before had been traded by the Phillies to St. Louis. This was along in August, and Niehoff started his first series with the Giants in Philadelphia. In the second game of that series Niehoff, in racing into right field after a short fly ball, collided with Ross Young, and in the collision Niehoff had his leg broken and was moved to a Philadelphia hospital.

Next morning McGraw visited Niehoff at the hospital, and when told the extent of his injuries he said: "Bert, you won't be able to play any more this season, so here's a check for your salary for the balance of the year. I'll pay your hospital bill here, and as you won't be of much use to my club next year I'll get you a position managing a class AA team at a better salary than you would draw by playing in the big leagues."

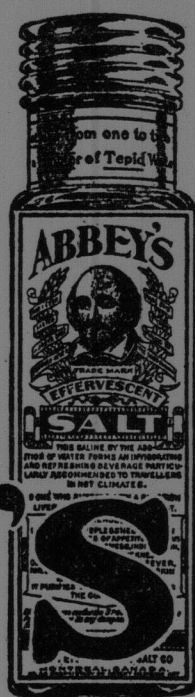

## SKIPPER SPEAKS OF FIRPO'S PLANS

Heavyweight Will Return  
to America Early in  
April.

New York, Feb. 5.—Luis Angel Firpo plans a re-entry into this country on April 2 or 3 for his 1924 pugilistic campaign during which he hopes to lick Wills and Dempsey, Capt. Thomas W. Sheridan, skipper of the "American Legion," which arrived from Buenos Aires, said that was what the boxer told him just before sailing.

"When Firpo came down to the ship at Buenos Aires," he said, about five thousand fans trailed him. "We had to keep him inside as the stewards stopped work when he walked on deck. I fed him a plank steak, American style, and he told me that is what he intends to train on here. He was in training that day—he ate only about three pounds."

Paris, Feb. 5.—Quintin Romero-Rojas, Chilean heavyweight, sailed from Marseilles for Buenos Aires yesterday, intending to challenge Luis Firpo. He will also try to arrange a match with Ermilio Spalla, if the Italian champion remains in South America long enough after his fight with Firpo.
