Intervention Against Johnson
New York, Aug. 11.—Ban Johnson,
president of the American League, was
served upon his arrival here from Chi-
cago yesterday with an injunction pre-
venting him from interfering with the

Johnson said he would be present at the
Mays hearing on Tuesday before Justice
Luce of the New York supreme court,

The Lesson Ty Cobb Teaches
(Toronto Globe).
Announcement that Ty Cobb, most
famous of baseball players, has received
since 1914 a salary of \$20,000 a year is
sure to provoke discussion and com-
parisons between the pittance paid to many
professional men and the big sum drawn
by the exponent of a game. Fuel may
be added to the flame by the declaration
of President Navin of the Detroit club
that he would not sell the release of the
player for \$100,000, because he is "the
best drawing card in the big leagues."

That is business, so also is Cobb's in-
sistence on getting the money he de-
sires. Without entering upon any discus-
sion of the ethics of the situation, there is
a lesson in "Ty" Cobb and his salary for
many a youth just starting in his career
as workman or professional practitioner.

Cobb works every minute that he is on
the field in a game or at practice. To a
natural ability to play baseball he adds
the willingness to use his brains on and
off the field. He does not wait for men-
tal exercise until he gets into action
against opposing teams; he plans many
moves away from the baseball field al-
together, as many other good players do
of course, and is the more ready to meet
any emergency that arises because he
has foreseen it. He puts all his muscu-
lar strength and his mental ability
into the task that he has in hand, and
thousands of baseball patrons who see
him think that he was born to the game
and could not play indifferently if he
tried. Their view is superficial. "Play
up, play up, and play the game," may
not be his privately adopted motto, but
it is "Ty" Cobb's actual practice, and
the young man who would succeed in
life would not be far wrong if he fol-
lowed it. Hard work is the royal road
to success, though it may not always
bring in a "Ty" Cobb salary.


