MR. COPP IN CITY

Opposition Leader Brings Cheering Message of Victory on June 20

Among the arrivals on the Montreal train at noon today was A. B. Copp, the able leader of the opposition forces in the province, who reached the city to find his party well organized and greatly enthusiastic as to the outlook for a sweeping victory on June 20, as are the Liberals in other sections of New Brunswick. He was greatly pleased on learning of the hearty reception being accorded the candidates in St. John and county and looks for a splendid victory.

Mr. Copp said he had visited various parts of the province and had just come from Charlotte county where the candidates of the opposition were certain of polling up a satisfactory majority on election day. The government ticket in that county, he said, was weak and there was little hope of Charlotte returning a government candidate. He noted that Mr. Hazen had been called into the fray to bid as far as possible, but about all could be said for was hope. Victory was the verdict with the opposition throughout the province.

JAMES J. HILL COMING HERE

Noted Railroad Man to Join Yacht at St. John on Cruise to His Labrador Salmon River

A New York despatch says that James J. Hill arrived there yesterday from his home in Minneapolis, and by the end of the week will start with a party of old friends for the annual salmon fishing trip to Canada. They will come to St. John by rail, and Mr. Hill's yacht Waconda will be taken here for the rest of the way to his salmon river in Labrador.

Mr. Hill, interviewed in New York, was fairly optimistic on the general outlook, pronouncing the condition of the crops in the northwest better than in three or four years at this date, but judging the volume of business being transacted in that part of the country to be only fair.

Asked if a great increase in prosperity was about to be witnessed, he answered: "I cannot say that, it will come when the man who pays the bills is ready. He is not ready yet. No, I do not mean the capitalist. By the man who pays the bills I mean anybody who has got more than his hands and the clothes on his back."

LOCAL NEWS

BARBERS WANT INCREASE OF PAY

The Halifax barbers have notified their employers that they were an increase in pay. They want for each man, besides the wages of \$12 a week, half of all receipts on his work above \$15. Thus if a man takes in \$24 in a week he would be paid \$12, plus \$3. If a favorable reply is not received by next Saturday they will cease work. There are forty-one in the union.

BROKE HIS ARM.

John, the five-year-old child of John Burt, of Adelaide street, while playing in the yard in the rear of his home there yesterday, stumbled from a platform, and in falling broke his arm. The little fellow was attended by Dr. C. M. Pratt, and is somewhat improved today. The peculiar part of the accident is that the platform from which he fell was not more than eight or nine inches high, but in falling his arm became doubled beneath him and the fracture resulted.

DIED IN SACKVILLE

Word of the death of Mrs. Charles H. Rigby, of Sackville, formerly Miss Cromwell, of Metcalf street, was received here today. She had been a resident of Sackville for some years, and had been in poor health for a few days ago and was present when the death took place. Mrs. Rigby is survived by her husband and three children, her parents, two sisters and two brothers. The body will be brought here tonight and will be buried here.

Recorder Baxter and the Independence of Parliament Act

In his speech at the Little River meeting last evening, Hon. Wm. Pugsley brought up the matter of attacks made upon him by Recorder Baxter, one of the Conservative county candidates.

While Recorder Baxter was paid by the city, said Hon. Mr. Pugsley, he held his appointment at the pleasure of the government and in that respect was in the same position as the registrar of deeds, who would not be paid by the government though he was paid by the people who register deeds. Mr. Baxter's being in the legislative position was a matter of course, and the city under the conditions cited was contrary to the spirit of Independence of Parliament Act.

HOME FROM WASHINGTON

James B. Daly Was at Unveiling of Columbus Memorial

After having attended the Columbus celebration in Washington, James B. Daly, a member of St. John council, K. of C. No. 837, returned to the city today, highly pleased from the trip. He had been accompanied from Boston by his two nieces, Misses Mary and Clara Daly, of Boston. There were no other St. John members among the Knights in attendance, but the various councils in the states and in Upper Canada were liberal represented, there being more than 30,000 members of the order assembled in the American capital for the celebration.

The festivities were most impressive and interesting. In addition to the banquet, which was one of the prime features of the celebration, and for which the cost per plate was \$29, Mr. Daly said that the big parade was an inspiring spectacle. He stood for two hours and a half in one place while the lengthy procession filed by, twenty-five deep, and with forty-four President Taft was at the unveiling of the Columbus memorial and delivered an eloquent address. O. A. Hornsby, territorial deputy for Cuba, was at the head of a delegation of knights from that country, who took part in the parade. He is a former resident of St. John.
