

DOWN WITH TYPHOID

Six Other Officers Are Also Stricken With Fever—Ontario Woman's Family Increases on Steamship Virginia—Sir Chas. Fitzpatrick Sails for Home

London, Sept. 10.—Captain Pellatt, of the Queen's Own Rifles, is critically ill with typhoid fever in London; there are no complications. Six other officers, including the medical officer, and Col. Pellatt's secretary, are in hospital typhoid-stricken.

Ontario Benefits by Good Roads Movement

Toronto, Sept. 10.—(Special)—The progress of the good roads movement during the past few years recorded in the annual report on highways improvements just issued. The report was prepared by W. A. McLean, provincial engineer of highways. Seventeen counties have taken advantage of the opportunity for road improvement given by the act of 1907, which provides government assistance to municipalities making improvements. Expenditure under the act since 1907 has been \$2,128,122.92.

CRIPPEN'S COUNSEL WILL DEFEND LENEVE ALSO

This Will Give Prisoners Opportunity to Consult—Expert Evidence to Counteract That of Prosecution Unusual in England

London, Sept. 10.—Arthur Newton, counsel for Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, who is on trial here charged with the murder of his wife has been engaged to defend Clara Le Neve, Crippen's typist, who is on trial as an accessory after the fact. This will enable close co-operation between the two accused persons, who heretofore had not been permitted to consult with one another.

Another step in the fight for the prisoners was taken yesterday when two pathologists engaged by the defense examined the body unsearched in Crippen's cell. Solicitor Newton expects to receive reports from these pathologists in time for use as the basis for his cross-examination of the police experts when the trial of Dr. Crippen and Miss Le Neve will be continued next Wednesday.
