ELECTRIC LIGHT GROWTH. From 30,000 Lamps in 1881 to 500,000,000 in Forty Years. In a bulletin issued recently by the New York State Committee on Public Utility Information the statement is made that the commercial manufacture of incandescent electric lamps was begun in 1881, when 30,000 lamps were produced. In 1921, forty years later, 500,000,000 lamps, or 16,666 times as many, were made.

ELECTRIC LIGHT GROWTH. The first successful effort to burn a carbonized cotton thread by means of an electric current in a glass bulb from which the air had been exhausted was made by Thomas Edison in 1879. Carbon filaments of various types continued in use for more than a generation before the development of the modern tungsten filament, and ten years of study and work were necessary to adapt tungsten to filament uses.

ELECTRIC LIGHT GROWTH. As a result, the present-day electric lamp, with its metallic filament, gives three times as much light as the carbon filament lamp. In constant effort to improve the quality and service of electric lamps, one manufacturer alone burns out 80,000 lamps each year to determine their power and durability. To pass inspection, the glass bulbs used for the lamps are not permitted to vary more than six ten-thousandths of an inch, for the filaments more than one hundred-thousandths of an inch in thickness.
