

# A. S. EMERY WINS DOMVILLE CUP WITH BIG SCORE

## SAINT JOHN MAN MAKES 49 OUT OF POSSIBLE 50

### Lieut-Col. Wetmore Offers Trophy for Competition Among Old Members

SUSSEX, Aug. 5.—Beautiful weather greeted the marksmen in the P. R. A. meet here this morning. The shooting opened with the Domville match, 10 shots at 300 yards. Sgt. A. S. Emery of the 3rd N. B. Med. Brigade, Can. Artillery, Saint John, won the match with the phenomenal score of 49 out of a possible 50.

The officers' match at 200 and 600 yards is also being shot this morning. The last range of the Prince of Wales, also the Cadet and Association team matches will be fired this afternoon.

At the competitors' meeting last evening Lieut-Col. S. S. Wetmore offered to donate a cup to the association for competition by old members, those who had been in attendance at meetings for at least 20 years, the cup to be shot for and won outright at the next annual matches. This offer was accepted with enthusiasm.

He was Lord in waiting to Queen Victoria, 1905-1901 and is A. D. C. to King George. Lord Harris is one of the best known cricketers in Great Britain.

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## MONTREAL GAS RATE AGAIN REDUCED

### Reduction is Sixth Made Since 1901, Utility Company Declares

Montreal, Aug. 5.—Reduction in service rates as applied to gas are announced by the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Consolidated, the city utility company, today.

The present rate is \$1.10 per thousand cubic feet consumed. This will be reduced by five cents, the latest reduction, and this reduction follows throughout a schedule whose charges are \$1.10 per thousand cubic feet, instead of 60 cents a thousand cubic feet as at present.

The utility company states that it is the sixth cut made in gas rates since 1901.

### Question of Qualification Not Ruled on by B. E. Service League

FREDERICTON, Aug. 5.—The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League which has succeeded the Great War Veterans Association and which through its New Brunswick council will proceed to organize all the chief centres of New Brunswick is to grant considerable leeway to its branches in the matter of qualification for membership.

The G. W. V. A. was organized on a basis of service in the war against Germany and the countries associated with it.

Service in various branches of the Imperial or other services is accepted as qualification for membership in the Canadian Legion of the B. E. S. L. Five years service in the active militia, or taken in the reserve militia, or for those who had not served during the war. Objection was taken to that clause in the constitution which refused to accept the transfer to the new organization.

The decision now is to let each branch decide who will be accepted as its members and in that way avoid any difference in opinion.
