THE TOLL OF DEATH

"Government Alone Guilty"
Says the Liberal Rech.

MOSCOW'S GOVERNOR SHOT

Bullet Reached Him While Driving in
a Cab—Cabmen Had Been Warned
Not to Drive Any of the Generals—
The Assassin Escaped—Col. Rie-
man Assassinated at Luga—
Another Treppoff Mistake.

Warsaw, Aug. 28.—Gen. Von Liliars-
ski, acting military Governor-General
of Warsaw, was shot and killed at 2
o'clock yesterday afternoon, while driv-
ing in a cab. The assassin escaped. Yes-
terday morning an unknown man warn-
ed the cabmen of this city generally not
to drive any of the generals.
Gen. Von Liliarski was driving a
carriage from the commandant's office
to his residence. As the driver slack-
ened speed, where the street was torn
up for repaving, an unknown young
man fired four shots at Von Liliars-
ski, through the top of the carriage,
which was up on each wheel, one of
the bullets entering the general's
breast, under the heart. The driver of
the carriage drove at full speed to the
hospital, where the general died almost
instantly.
Von Liliarski had only recently
been appointed acting military governor
of this city.

Col. Rieinan Assassinated.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 28.—A report
reached St. Petersburg late yesterday
afternoon that Col. Rieinan of the Sem-
enovskiy Guard Regiment had been as-
sinated at Luga.

An unsuccessful attempt upon the life
of Baron Stahle is reported to have been
made in the park at Peterhof Sunday
night. Baron Stahle bears some resem-
blance to Gen. Treppoff, commander of
the palace. A number of officers with
beards, who might be mistaken for
Gen. Treppoff, have had their whiskers
shaved off.

A police captain, two gendarmes
and a conductor were killed in a train
at Tamboff by a band of revolutionists
near here Sunday.

The police of Rostov yesterday captured
a depot of revolutionary stores, in-
cluding twenty-four bombs.
The open campaign against the Govern-
ment which the social revolutionists
inaugurated with the attempt to kill
Premier Stolypin Saturday and the as-
sassination of Gen. Min Sunday, has
produced such a feeling of resentment
at Peterhof that the spectre of a dicta-
torship has been revived.

The Government, it said, can only
rely on force to fight the revolution-
ists as the public press, in spite of the
killing of a score of innocent persons,
remains coldly indifferent. Indeed,
while expressing formal words of con-
demnation, the hidden satisfaction at
the fact that the object of the con-
spiracy is to strike the head of the
Government is being admitted.

Land For Peasants.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 28.—The distribu-
tion of Crown appanages, a main ad-
vantage of the administration's agrarian
program by which it is hoped to win
the peasantry to the support of the
Government at the coming elections,
was put in effect yesterday when an
ukase was published, transferring 4-
500,000 acres of appanage lands to the
Peasants' Bank for distribution to the
peasants.

Mutiny On Battleships.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 28.—News
reached St. Petersburg today that 21
men belonging to the battleship
Panteleimon, formerly the Kniaz Po-
tomkin, on which a mutiny occurred
last year, seized a cutter and landed
on Berenzan Island, where Lieut.
Schmidt, the mutineer, was executed
and planted a red flag there.

Meetings of seamen belonging to the
Black Sea fleet are said to have been
held at various places in the harbor
and the reports of troops are reported to
have been sent to Odessa and Sebastopol.

Decide Not to Strike.

Hamilton, Aug. 28.—At its meeting
this morning the Hamilton Street Rail-
waymen's Union decided against a
strike at this time. It is said a letter
was received from Hon. Mr. Gibson of
the Cataract Power Co. which was a de-
termining factor in the matter.

Brought Wilson Home.

Toronto, Aug. 28.—Detective Twigg
returned from Buffalo last night, hav-
ing in custody R. Wilson, the young
salesman of John Kay, Son & Co., who
was arrested while disposing of a \$350
ring, the property of his employers. Wil-
son is a young married man.

For Attempted Murder.

St. Thomas, Aug. 28.—Newton
Stonehouse, a carpenter, was yesterday
committed for trial for attempted murder
of a new-born babe. His wife was
committed last week on the same charge.

Two Barns Burn.

Belleville, Aug. 28.—Charles E. Ver-
milion of Sidney lost two barns by fire
Sunday night with the season's crops.
Cause of fire unknown. Loss \$1,500; in-
surance \$600.

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FIELDING IN FAVOR

Conservatives Reridge His Elec-

IN THE HOUSE IN NOVEMBER

Vindictive Attacks on the Minister of
Finance and the Electorate of Nova
Scotia Resented by All Classes of
the People—Condemnation of
Conservative Soreheads—Lurid
Tales Gross Libel on Province.

Halifax, Aug. 28.—Hon. W. S. Field-
ing yesterday morning came up from
Chester, where his family are summer-
ing, and left for Ottawa the same af-
ternoon. He will probably return to
Nova Scotia at an early date, and it
can safely be predicted will be back
in his seat in the House at the Novem-
ber session.

As an evidence of the feeling which
has been aroused among Conservatives
of the better class over the vindictive
attacks made on the Minister of Finance,
leading Conservatives are circu-
lating and signing a petition in Queen's
and Shelburne urging him to continue
as representative of that constituency,
and pledging not only their support,
but his election by acclamation. This

people of Nova Scotia generally.

FRANK MACKELCAN DEAD.

City Solicitor of Hamilton Has a Fatal
Stroke of Paralysis.

Hamilton, Aug. 28.—Word was re-
ceived in the city last night from
Penetanguishene of the death at
that place of Frank Mackelcan, city
solicitor. He died of a stroke of
paralysis last Friday, from
which he never rallied.

The news was a great shock to his
numerous friends, who anticipated that
his stay in the Muskoka district would
result in his complete recovery to
health. He had been ill for many
months, and had not been able to at-
tend to his duties as city solicitor for
some time.

The remains will be brought here
to-day for burial, but the funeral ar-
rangements have not yet been made.
The deceased was a son of Dr. John
Mackelcan, and was born in Ancaster
about 74 years ago. He had been
engaged in the practice of law for up-
wards of fifty years, and was for
thirty years a partner in the law
firm of Mackelcan, Gibson & Bell.

About ten years ago he received the
appointment of city solicitor, and
shortly after retired from the firm in
order to devote his whole time and
attention to the city's interests.

He was a past president of the St.
George's Society, and the Hamilton
Law Association, besides being a Ma-
son. He leaves a widow and one son.

Best Lighted Route.

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—Hon. L. P. Bro-
deur, who returned to the city yester-
day, says that he has just returned
from an enquiry into the aids to navi-
gation along the St. Lawrence route.
The French admiral told him that he
knew of no route better lighted than
the St. Lawrence. However, there
was some improvement being made.
Some new lights and foghorns were to
be added.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur added: In spite of
the fact that we do improve the St. Law-
rence route, the fact is that the dis-
crimination against us and in favor of
the Erie route is still being maintained.
The discrimination policy is strengthened
by the erroneous reports of accidents that
are cable to London. Our own press
at home are not free from blame. We
must endeavor to get rid of this unjust

Cottage Wrecked by Lightning.

Severn Bridge, Aug. 28.—Sunday
morning, during an electric storm, the
cottage of Dr. Hamilton of Pittsburg,
located on Sparrow Lake, was struck
by lightning and almost totally wreck-
ed, as well as the furniture. His wife
was not yet up, and although the bed
was literally demolished and set on fire
in a number of places she did not feel
the slightest shock and soon ex-
tinguished the fire. The doctor, who was
standing near the window, was severely
stunned.

Earl Grey In an Accident.

Winnipeg, Aug. 28.—The vice-regal
party left yesterday morning for Por-
tage, where they received a hearty wel-
come.

Earl Grey is suffering from a slight
accident which happened in Winnipeg.
While standing near an electric light
bulb on Sunday night, it exploded, and
a portion of the glass entered his right
eye. Medical aid was summoned and
the glass extracted. It is hoped that
no serious effects will result.

Her Son Is Dead.

Toronto, Aug. 28.—There is sad news
for Mrs. Thomas Gray, if she can be
located. Her son is dead at Belcarres,
Sask. The C. P. R. Telegraph Co. and
the detective department failed to lo-
cate her last night. The address given
was Mrs. Gray, 145 Chestnut street,
but she was not there.
