The flames lighted the country for eur of the conflagration from viewpoints on the lake made a new sensaion for the population in little hamlets within a radius of ten miles. The fire broke out shortly after dark.

The fire was thought to have been confined to that portion of the yards north of the connecting track between the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern, on which was piled 24,000,-000 feet of lumber. The fire started in he lath shed and blew directly toward he piles of lumber.

The wind carried the flames away from the town and Sand Point is in no danger unless the wind veers.

Fire Extinguished. Spokane, Wash., April 29.-After plazing flercely all night, and resultng in the destruction of about 30,000,-000 feet of lumber, entailing a loss of \$365,000, the fire in the Humbird Lumper Company's yards at Sand Point, Idaho, was extinguished early this morning. The combined efforts of the fire depratments of Sand Point, Pend D'Oreille and Kootenai were needed to subdue the flames, but so efficient was the work of the firemen that the big planing and cutting mill of the company was saved, in spite of the fact that for most of the night the mill was in the centre of 25 acres of seeth-

The yards of the Humbird Company ay between the Great Northern and Northern Pacific tracks, and the fire started in the lath shed. A strong breeze carried the flames quickly into the shipping division of the yards, where 24,000,000 feet of lumber were piled. In an effort to keep the fire from spreading from this to the mill, great stacks of lumber were dynamited by the mill hands, and in this way the buildings were saved. Flying cinders ignited other parts of the yards, however, so that at times 60,000,000 feet

were blazing.
Throughout the fire, crews from the mills and from the two railway systems worked like beavers in the yards, saving what they could and aiding the firemen in their fight against the SAYS SWOPE'S COFFIN
