COMMERCIAL

BANK OF ENGLAND.

LONDON, May 16.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes:
Total reserve decreased \$487,000. Circulation decreased \$148,000. Bullion decreased \$217,857. Other securities decreased \$240,000. Other deposits increased \$2,375,000. Public deposits increased \$1,012,000.
Notes reserve decreased \$279,000. Government securities unchanged. The proportion of the bank's reserve to its liability this week is 46.37 per cent, compared with 46.70 last week.

BANK OF BEAGAL.

CALCUTTA, May 16.—The rate of discount of the Bank of Bengal was reduced today from 6 to 5 per cent.

UNCHANGED.

LONDON, May 16.—The Bank of England's rate of discount remains unchanged today at four per cent.

WALL STREET.

NEW YORK, May 16.—Opening prices of stocks were little altered from last night's closing, a number of the usually active issues starting unchanged. The dealings were insignificant in volume. The market opened irregular.

COTTON MANUFACTURERS MEET.
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 16.—Much business was crowded into the concluding session today of the American Cotton Manufacturers' Association's convention. The report of the secretary and treasurer showed the organization to be in a prosperous condition.

POOR CROPS EXPECTED.

ODESSA, May 16.—The European wheat situation is regarded by competent grain merchants here as being most unfavorable. The present prices are the highest the experts on the bourse can remember to have been quoted in Russia for decades past. The provinces of Bessarabia, Poltava, Kherson and Podolia are gravely affected. Seventy-five per cent of the winter crops have been damaged by the cold weather and dry spring. Owing to the sudden rise in temperature a fortnight ago, the entire spring crops will be lost unless rain falls within a week, in which case possibly 85 per cent of the spring crop will be rescued.

The president of the grain bourse attributes the present prices in Russia to the foreign quotations of grain, which Russia is compelled to follow owing to the exhaustion of her stocks. The prospect of a crop failure, however, has not caused any speculation in grain.

PRESIDENT'S NAME INVOLVED IN HAYWOOD MURDER TRIAL



Court House in which accused men will be tried.

BOISE, Idaho, May 16.—The unexpected uncovering of a vein of prejudice against Harry Orchard and his testimony during the further examination of the trial of William D. Haywood for complicity in the murder of former Governor Steiensenberg, today led to the first sharp wrangle between counsel and involved the name of President Roosevelt in an acrimonious discussion. The day and the incident began with Samuel Wingate, the eleventh witness, in the hands of defense for examination in chief.

Questioning had proceeded a short distance when it developed that Wingate was biased against Orchard and unwilling to accept the testimony which it is expected he will give against Haywood. The defense naturally tried at once to show that Wingate's state of mind on the subject was not such as would warrant his removal from the box, but when the witness refused to answer questions, the defense re-passed to the hands of the state Senator Booth, quickly drew from him the flat-footed statement that he could not under any circumstances give evidence to Orchard.

Wingate was on this excuse, the defense excepting to the court's ruling and from the defense forward the state was particularly to test all witnesses on the point. Testimony A. P. Burns, who finally succeeded Wingate's seat, said under oath that he was not prepared to give the same credence to Orchard that he would extend to other witnesses, but his attitude was not deemed sufficient to warrant his removal.

The jury box was finally filled with twelve witnesses subjected to examination and temporarily passed by both sides at 3:40 o'clock in the afternoon, and the court announced that it was in order for both sides to exercise peremptory challenges. Counsel for Haywood asked for a few minutes delay, and for five minutes they gathered around the chair of the prisoner and engaged in earnest consultations as to their course on the men occupying the box.

The state exercised its right first and excused William Van Orsdale, a grocer, who has occupied seat No. 2 since the opening day of the trial. George P. Maw, a young farmer,

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with some strong opinions as to the acts of certain elements in the labor unions of the country, was then called to the vacant place.

The state passed him and he was still in the hands of the defense when adjournment hour was reached.

The trial will not be resumed until 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon because of the funeral in the morning of Judge Nugent, father of John P. Nugent, one of the counsel for the defense.

This recess may extend the completion of the jury beyond the end of this week. Between prosecution and defense there is 30 peremptory challenges. One of these had been used. It is generally admitted that both sides intend to use fully their peremptory rights, and the political composition of the tentative jury may be entirely changed.

The examination of the witness today indicated a desire to investigate the question of the local prejudice. Counsel recalled the trouble in the Cour d'Alene region fifteen or eighteen years ago, and made careful inquiry as to its possible effects on the minds and prejudices of the prospective jurors.

The rest of their examination covered the wide range of subjects already outlined. The state, besides its general line of questions and the attitude toward Harry Orchard, introduced today, is also covering membership in labor unions and the possible existence of prejudice for or against them.

The prisoner was again an active participant in the conduct of his case. He repeatedly consulted with his attorneys and watched the proceedings with attention as alert as theirs.

The court room failed to fill again today. The people of Boise are following the case with interest, but the city is unwilling to spare more than a score of its inhabitants to sit through the proceedings in court.
