BREACH OF PROMISE  
ACTION AT SEVENTY

VIENNA, Aug. 8.—Frau Poeckh, who is seventy years of age, was sued in the High Court here yesterday for £2,000 damages for breach of promise.

Herr Johann Eggenberger, a retired shopman, of Baden, who brought the action, said Frau Poeckh had lived at his house, and some time ago instigated to his daughter that it was a pity he did not marry again.

He thereupon proposed to the old lady, who had considerable wealth, and she consented on condition that he give up his business. The engagement was ratified by a handshake and a kiss.

Frau Poeckh disposed of his shop, when Frau Poeckh changed her mind and advised him to get a wife from some almshouse, as she could never think of marrying any one who had been a shopman.

Frau Poeckh denied that she ever became engaged, and added that she would rather hang herself than marry. The court accepted her version, and gave a verdict with costs accordingly.

NEW LOBSTER GROUNDS.  
Good Catches Have Recently Been Made in Deep Water Fishing.

(Gloucester Times.)  
For the first time in the annals of the fishing industry lobsters have been caught on the banks, and now a new source for the supply has been discovered more than seventy-five miles off Cape Elizabeth.

The schooner J. R. Atwood, Captain Lowry, of Southport, Me., arrived at Boston yesterday with a load of 2,005 lobsters caught on Gashes bank in the ordinary traps.

The men made only eight hauls with one hundred traps before they had the vessel loaded. The depth was about six fathoms and the bottom was rocky, with also considerable kelp. The news of this catch caused much surprise on T. wharf, but in a short time it is expected that there will be many boats out on the banks looking for lobsters.

The one drawback to lobster fishing on Gashes bank, however, is that it lies directly in the path of the big steamers and there is usually much fog in the vicinity.

Captain Lowry said that during his short stay there he was fortunate enough to escape thick weather.

John G. Cox, of Boston, one of the best posted men in the lobster industry, said: "This inauguration of Deep-sea lobster fishing means more than any one can imagine. It means that the trade may be revolutionized, and that lobsters will now be fished for and caught out at sea instead of along shore as has always been the custom."

Captain Lowry of the Atwood said that he had one hundred traps, that he had set them seventy miles from shore, pulled them eight times, and caught 2,005 lobsters. He said that he would have caught more had this not been the shedding season, when the lobsters are in hiding.

## THE LOVE STORY OF JOHN BURNS

How His Clever Wife Waited and Then Helped Him to Success.

Congratulations to our labor cabinet minister and the gentle lady who is his wife. They have just celebrated their silver wedding!

"John Burns has always been lucky," was the comment of one of his oldest friends on that memorable morning, nearly a couple of years ago, when the public learned from its newspapers that John Burns, the boy who slaved in a candle factory as a child of ten, had become president of the local government board and the first labor cabinet minister in this country. "But"—after a moment's reflection—"the luckiest day in his life was when he married his wife." The Right Hon. John Burns and Mrs. Burns celebrated their silver wedding in the pleasant home near Clapham Common which is now their home.

There would seem to have been little time for romance in so strenuous a career as that of our labor minister, and yet the love story of John Burns and his wife is a real romance, and one with Clapham Common as its setting.

John Burns was only sixteen when he fell in love with Miss Charlotte Gale, the pretty, fair-haired daughter of a Battersea shipwright. Of course, marriage was never even thought of, and, perhaps, in the eventful years that followed, when the future statesman sought his fortune as an engineer on the West Coast of Africa he forgot his little sweet heart at home.

But they were to meet again. John Burns came back to the old country, to take his place as a foremost speaker on the labor platform.

A SILENT ADMIRER.  
It was on a Sunday afternoon, more than a quarter of a century ago, that John Burns found himself addressing an open-air meeting on Clapham Common. Young as he was, the fiery eloquence, the power to hold the attention of men enchain was already his, and the police, scenting danger, for those were troublous times, dispersed the crowd, and for some reason arrested the speaker. Not till the future president of the Local Government Board found himself in the grip of the constables did he notice that among his audience had been Charlotte Gale, the girl who as a child had so attracted him. Sympathy mingled with indignation at the treatment he had received from the eyes that met his. No words passed, but after a slight interval the idol of Battersea was discharged, hero in the eyes of at least one woman.

Their marriage followed. John Burns, in his character as a public man, welcomes the limelight, revels in a healthy publicity from which many another statesman might shrink.

But the home life in the little house at Lavender Hill, is his own, he will tell you; private, sacred, a thing apart. Only those who know him best know how happy that home life has been. In the stormy period of the dockers' strike, while her husband was organizing the men, Mrs. Burns was looking after the half-starved women and children.

As it was with Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone, the lovers of Haverdon, with Lord Salisbury and his wife, and in our own day with Sir Henry and Lady Campbell-Bannerman, so it is with Mr. and Mrs. Burns.

The head of a lesser woman than the wife of the first labor minister might easily have been turned from the evening of the political pendulum sent her husband into the ministry at a single bound.

MRS. BURNS AND AN ARISTOCRAT.  
Not so Mrs. Burns. Gentle and refined,
