The address given this afternoon by Dr. Irving Fisher, of Yale, before the Association of Life Insurance Presidents of New York, which is published in this paper, contains the most practical suggestion made for some time in the campaign against preventable diseases. Dr. Fisher urges that life insurance companies take up the fight, and shows by statistics the financial benefits which would result. He speaks truly when he says that any movement finds greatest success when its commercial aspect becomes a factor. If we could only bring home to the people the knowledge that a man or woman rescued from consumption represents a certain material profit to every healthy resident of a commun-

ity, the anti-tuberculosis campaign would no longer be hampered by general indifference and apathy on the part of the people. Dr. Fisher in his address did not refer to Germany, but he might easily have presented statistics proving that the struggle against disease is by far applied in that country. "On the basis of these ratios of preventability, or rather postponability of death, has been computed the possible extension of the average human life by saving lives now lost by preventable diseases. "Even in these safe premises of partial postponability of deaths, we find that about 2 years of the possible lengthening of human life would be due to the elimination of preventable diptheria; as to the elimination of preventable accidents. THE STERN ENGLISH LAW.

Both in Canada and the United States there is forming a public opinion on the allied subjects of crime and insanity that would make short shrift of the tragic absurdites of the law of the tragic absurdities of the law bearing upon them if it were given an opportunity to declare itself. An epi-grammatic writer recently summed up the situation in Canada by saying They have little or no chance of escape. The result is that the plea of insanity is not so frequently put in as the situation in Canada by saying that in this country if the present tendency went much further no one would be sane enough or healthy enough to hang. This humorous exaggeration has too much truth in it to be passed over with a smile. In a recent Toronto case the supposed weak-mindedness of the victim of an outrageous assault was urgled as a reason why her assailants should not insanity is not so frequently put in as in similar cases in the United States and Canada. A murderer figures out that if he tries to prove an alibi or justifiable homicide, he has, first of all, a chance of escaping altogether; then he has a chance of a ten or fitteen-year stretch, and a speedy death at the worst. Even a sentence of life imprisonment carries with it the like-lihood of being mitigated by good behavior to twenty-five years or so. Al plea of insanity, on the other hand,

be too sternly realt with.

SAINE ENOUGH TO HANG.

A very important decision bearing on the plea of insanity has been given by the Supreme Court of New Jersey. It takes the ground that a murderer need not be wholly sane to pay the extreme penalty of his act. The Court of Errors and Appeals has sustained this decision. The case in point is particularly interesting in view of the fact that the alleged insanity of the murderer was not discovered until after his conviction. Then the lawyers sought to save him from the gallows, but the supreme court has held that convicted murderers unless proved insane at the time of their trial are not in the indeed of puries investigating such matters as insanity, and urges what, Then the lawyers sought to save him from the gallows, but the supreme court has held that convicted murderers unless proved insane at the time of their trial, are not to be judged by the same sanity standards as other persons. All that is necessary is that they comprehend their impending fate. If they can undertand that they are to be hanged, then hanged they will be Even if a murder's mental condition were such as wouldn't justify sending a free man to an asylum, it should not save his neck as long as he is sane enough to realize that he has been convicted of murder, and sentenced to be destroyed.

The Tribune protests against the farce of juries investigating such matters as insanity, and urges what, in the opinion of many, is a greater farce—trial by a medical commission of experts. The jury system may have failed in many celebrated cases, but the expert system has broken down utterly. An expert can be found to several experts could be collected in twenty-four hours to prove that the earth is flat; but no jury could be got together to give a verdict in favor of this theory.

THE MATTEAWAN.

How the insanity plea is overworked in New York State was described in a paper read to the State Bar Associa on by Dr. R. B. Lamb, super dent of the Matteawan State Hospital. He showed that of thirty-four patients, fourteen ultimately returned to asylums or to prison or subsequent crimes. Eleven were either useless or troublesome members of society: two committed suicide, six disappeared, and only one became partly self-supcommitted suicide, six disappeared, and only one became partly self-supporting. That is to say, out of the thirty-four released inmates, only one should have been given his liberty. As the New York Tribune remarks it has been altogether too easy to get prisoners into Hatteawan and too easy to get them out.

DURING HIS MAJESTY'S PLEAS-

Just the reverse is true of the criminal who is sent to an English asylum. In the first place, it is hard to convince judge and jury that the murderer in whose defence the insanity plea is advanced should not pay the ordinary penalty for his crime. If he does escape the gallows, and goes to an asylum, his warrant for committal reads that he is to be held "during his Majesty's pleasure." The words give an erroneous impression that his detention is to be of a casual nature, and that he is apt to be released as soon as a few red-tape formalities have been undergone. DIRECT WIRE 7,000 MILES

Message From London to Calcutta Sent Without Relaying.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Telegraph messages have beg in to leave London on the longest distance ever travelled on a continuous wire. By touching a key here a telegrapher can now send a Calcutta message which passes without retransmission over 7,000 miles of field, forest, mountain and desert. Direct working has been possible between London and Teheran for five years, but a land line from Paris to India was only recently completed.
