

BIG SEASON FOR GAME NEAR NEWCASTLE

Sportsmen Seemed to Respect Laws — Tyler Gerrish Dead After Lingering Illness — Work on New Mill.

Newcastle, Nov. 30.—Tyler Gerrish passed away at his home at Indian-town on Saturday morning last, after a lingering illness. Deceased had been a great sufferer from cancer since April last. Mr. Gerrish was a son of the late John Gerrish and survived by his mother, two brothers, John and Henry of Indiantown, and two sisters, Mrs. Albert A. Axtell of East Millinocket and Miss Inez at home. Robert Vanderbeck of Douglstown is a half brother of the deceased and Mrs. Moses Astle of Millinocket is a half sister. The late Mr. Gerrish was in his 44th year.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock and was largely attended. The lengthy cortege testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held. He was interred in the service at the house and grave. The pall-bearers were John Jardine, James Hetherington, Alex. Davidson, John Stewart and Martin Holt. The deceased was a member of the Loyal Orange Lodge. The service of the Order was conducted at the funeral.

The big game hunting period closed Friday after a very successful season. There were a large number of hunters from all parts of America and others from Europe. Some exceptionally large moose were secured.

Chief Game Warden Dennis Doyle, speaking of the northern counties, said that hunters generally were living up to the provision of the act. He declared that the season was an extraordinary one for big game.

Richardson and Co. of Matane.

The Renous Bridge Lumber Co. has completed the excavation and foundation for the new mill at Millerton and the mill will be erected in the early spring. The portable mill of the concern has been placed at Baldwin's Sliding on the river. Logs are now being cut and hauled there and sawing will be commenced early in the new year.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, who has homesteaded a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section adjacent his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and wishes to pre-empt may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.


