HEALTH WORK OF RED CROSS NURSES

Nova Scotia Now Has Seven Nurses Engaged in an Educational Campaign.

Halifax, Jan. 10.—At a meeting of the Local Red Cross held recently, the work of their five nurses was reported, the account given showing the importance of the work undertaken and the necessity for its continuance. The summary included: Defects discovered, nutritional, 515; diseased tonsils, 1403; defective vision, 622. Health talks to the number of 183 have been given since November and 209 parents notified as to some defect in their children. Tooth brush drills held were 182. There are at present seven nurses on the staff.

Fear Two Aviators Fell Into Mississippi

Tiptonville, Tenn., Jan. 10.—Falling of an overcoat sleeve of Captain George H. Simpson, formerly of Toronto, pilot, and a cushion of a hydro-airplane in the Mississippi River near here today, was taken to indicate that Simpson and his mechanic, Carl Fisher, were dead.

Simpson and Fisher were enroute from Cincinnati on a \$2000 mile trip with films of a moving picture, and are supposed to have fallen into the river when their plane caught fire near Tiptonville on Sunday.
