St. Stephen, N. B., Jan. 28.—The civic
elections today proved to be interesting.
A very large vote was polled and sev-
eral surprises were in store for the citi-
zens.

In Queens ward, Councillor Parker
Grimmer was re-elected with 175 votes,
and Thomas Toal was elected with 168,
defeating Councillor Elwell deWolfe,
who received 101.

In Kings ward, the contest was inter-
esting, for there were four candidates.
Councillor A. D. Ganong and George H.
Budd were opposed by J. P. Wry and
Amos Mallory, the result was Councillor
Arthur D. Ganong was re-elected with
105 votes and Amos Mallory was elected
with 90. The other two candidates fol-
lowed very closely, J. P. Wry with 85,
and Geo. H. Budd, 79.

was read and approved. It showed that
during 1913 there had been five cases
of infectious disease, of which there were
seven cases of diphtheria, with two
deaths; six cases of scarlet fever, no
deaths; typhoid fever, eight cases, with
one death; measles, twenty cases, no
deaths; tuberculosis, three cases, one
death. Bills amounting to \$74.39 are in
the hands of the finance committee.

The report of the municipal home
ward, appointed to investigate and report
on the accounts for the past eight years,
was read and approved. The committee
was composed of Mr. A. E. Flewelling,
warden, and Messrs. J. H. Bond, D. Jones,
of Springfield. A vote was taken on the
report, and a new ballot resulted in
another tie. It was then moved to re-
scind the nominations and this was adopted.
Three additional men were put
in nominations.

Councillors Thos. Gilliland, Rothsay,
Wm. Jamieson of Sussex and S. H. Flew-
elling of Hampton. Councillor Jamieson's
name was withdrawn leaving four
candidates. The new ballot disclosed
the following result: E. Flewelling, 11;
F. E. Sharpe, 19; Thos. Gilliland and S.
H. Flewelling, 10; W. Jamieson, 1. Coun-
