The School Examination—Ten schools in the Institute—Visitors—Exercises. This morning the children of several of the Primary Schools of the city marched to the Mechanics' Institute. In the mixed schools the little boys marched first, in pairs, the girls followed, and the teachers marched in the rear, holding the "good little boy and girl" of the school by the hand. They were received by the Chairman of the Trustees, and the Secretary, some other members of the Board of Trustees were also present. The Institute was divided into sections, and the number of the school and name of the teacher were printed on a placard, which was placed at the end of the section. Small blackboards were supplied each school, and, for general use, there was a large one in front of the platform. There were ten schools present, and two of these were divided into two grades, so that there were twelve teachers. The following schools were present at the opening at 10 o'clock this morning:

Theall; No. 18, boys and girls, Miss E. Allen; No. 2, boys, Mr. D. George Bennett.

At 10.15 a. m. the schools were called to order by the Chairman, W. H. A. Keas, Esq., there being quite a number of visitors present, who occupied seats on the platform. Two verses of the National Anthem were sung, and Mr. Keas spoke a few words, explaining the reasons for the choice of the Institute. An exercise in reading was then commenced, and three were selected from each school, some of whom read well. Exercises in all the branches taught were also given. Dr. Bennett, the City Superintendent, being the examiner.

NEW YORK, July 8.

Frank Walworth was this morning sentenced to State Prison for life. Heavy showers of rain fell last night and this morning. The weather is hot and sultry. Numerous cases of sunstroke occurred yesterday.

Nine deaths from Cholera at Nashville and five at Memphis were reported yesterday.

In New York, yesterday, 31 accidents from firearms and fireworks occurred, and as many more in Brooklyn. Five fatal accidents at Rochester, N. Y., and many others reported from all parts of the country.

Tornadoes and rain storms inflicted great damage in Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, and other States during the present week.

Five persons, names unknown, two gentlemen, two ladies and a boy, while sailing in a boat at Chippawa, yesterday, were swept into the rapids over Niagara Falls.

Drowning of Rev. Dr. Lee—No Witnesses—Searching for the Body.

WESTFIELD, July 7.
The Rev. Dr. Lee, who has been staying at the Rev. Mr. Woodman's, in this place, is supposed to have been drowned this morning, between seven and eight o'clock. He remarked to Mr. Alex. Woodman that he was going to bathe. Mr. Woodman tried to persuade him not to go, as he was unacquainted with the place, but the Doctor remarked that he was a good swimmer, and proceeded to the river. Mr. Woodman followed him in about ten minutes, and when arriving at the bank, could see nothing of the Doctor, except his clothes, which were lying on the beach. He then shouted, but could receive no response.

Men with boats were then procured, and they were making every endeavor to recover the body but have not succeeded as yet. No marks on the beach can be found to track him, but there can be no doubt that he has been drowned, but the cause of which is quite unknown, as no person saw him in the water. The Rev. Mr. Woodman was not at home at the time, or it is probable that he would have accompanied the doctor. I shall report again whether the body is found or not.

LONDON, July 6.
A HINDOO RISING IN INDIA. A despatch from Bombay announced a rising among Hindoo peasants in the district of Poomal. They refuse to pay rents, and have plundered and burned several houses. 70 hands have been dispersed by the police.

ITALY.
The Ministerial crisis in Italy continues. More earthquakes occurred at Belluno yesterday, but no damage is reported.
