On Friday afternoon Franklin's Rhode Island battery at Edward's Ferry, opened fire upon the rebel fortifications in front of Leesburg and the neighboring woods where the rebel troops had been concealed.

The cannonading was kept up for six hours with shell, and it succeeded in driving back the troops to a safer distance.
