ALLIES REFUSE GERMANS' REPLY ON REPARATIONS

Hun Message Found Unacceptable in Its Present Form.

PARIS, March 25.—The German delegation here today delivered to the allied reparations commission the German reply to the note sent by the commission yesterday giving Germany warning of the infliction of penalties under the peace treaty unless she paid before May 1 the twelve billion gold marks, balance of the twenty billion mark payment due under article 235 of the treaty.

The commission decided that the reply was unacceptable in its present form and refused to accept it from the German delegates. The Germans agreed to draft another reply, which, however, will not be ready before next week.

HAS BEEN POSTPONED.

PARIS, March 25.—Consideration of the German policy towards Germany in view of her refusal to pay by May 1 the twelve billion marks gold demanded by the reparations commission as the balance of her twenty billion marks obligation under the peace treaty, will be postponed for a few days, it developed today.

GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES HELD IN ALL CHURCHES

Motoring and Angling Enthusiasts Open Season—Railway Traffic Heavy.

Good Friday in London was celebrated in diverse ways, ranging from the hilarious joyfulness of holidaying youngsters to the solemnity of those who looked upon it as a day of deep religious significance.

At different hours throughout the day services were held in many of the churches for those who wished to commemorate the crucifixion of Christ in worship. For the Methodists "Passion Services" were held, with the churches in each of the four sections of the city uniting. The gatherings were all held in the morning, and were addressed by special speakers. Services were also held in the Anglican and the Presbyterian churches during the morning and evening.

Although the country roads were good for this season of the year there were by no means conducive to motoring. The rainy weather, however, induced many car owners to spend the greater part of the day in leisurely drives about the city pavements.

Regardless of how early in the year it may come, Good Friday is always looked upon as the opening day of the fishing season by many of London's sportsmen. This year was no exception, for in the earliest hours of Friday the banks of the Thames River were teeming with anglers.

Throughout the day they waited patiently for bites with more or less success. The river was clear from muddy water despite the recent heavy rains.

The theatres of the city did an excellent business. Both the matinee and evening shows in every playhouse were well patronized.

Traffic on all the railroads was heavy during Thursday night and early morning of Friday morning. Hundreds of people of this city spent the day in the country or in other cities.

"OLIVET TO CALVARY" PRESENTED BY CHOIR

Excellent Service of Praise in King Street Church.

For the first time in its history, perhaps, the King Street Presbyterian Church was last night the scene of a service of praise, presented by the choir of the church under the direction of Leslie H. Roberts, the offering being Maunders' "Olivet to Calvary." This choir of forty voices, newly organized, was in excellent trim, attacking their subject with precision and feeling. At the choir responded to the mood of the leader. Deep religious fervor marked their whole offering, which came as a fitting climax to Good Friday. The only number, outside of the cantata was "There is a Green Hill." The solo work in the cantata was ably done by Miss Lillian Mowat, soprano; Ed. Webster, baritone; Miss Dora Bradley, contralto; Andrew Bull, tenor, and Francis Chay, tenor. Previous to the rendition of the cantata, Rev. W. R. McIntosh spoke briefly on the subject of the Crucifixion.

FIRST METHODIST MUSIC.

On Sunday special music will be given morning and evening by the choir and soloists of the First Methodist Church. Rev. Dr. Peever will preach in the morning on "The Easter Outlook and Hope of the World." At night a weird and wonderful cantata, "The Light of God," a musical realistic presentation of the descent of Christ into the dark abode of the dead, the lifting up forever of the "gates of brass" and the grand display of "the immortal's radiant wonder." The soloists will be Mrs. E. Wyatt and Carman Lear, Mr. Jordan, organist and leader, will play.

EASTER RETAIL TRADE IN LONDON FAVORABLE

Manufacturing Becoming More Active and Unemployment Decreasing.

London reports to Bradstreet's say that retail and wholesale business are both showing the beneficent influence of the approach of spring and of Easter week. Retail trade, especially in women's wear and millinery has been good, and there is no doubt that the tide has turned definitely, and from now on improvement is looked for.

Manufacturing is steadily becoming more active and unemployment is decreasing.

On the produce markets potatoes are at the moment rather scarce and prices firmer. Deliveries of eggs have been rather light at the beginning of the week, as farmers were tending to hold their stock for better prices at the end of the week under the Easter demand. Butter is scarce and firm. Hay, oats and wheat are firm. Collections are becoming better.

FOOT CRUSHED, BOY FAST IN TURNABLE

Police Work For Hour To Free 10-Year-Old Earle Lindsay.

Police were nearly an hour extricating the left foot of Earl Lindsay, 10-year-old son of John Lindsay, 134 Drensey avenue, from a crevice in the old Lake Erie and Detroit River turntable at Colborne street crossing Friday evening. The boy was playing with companions on the turntable, which has not been in use for many years, and his foot slipping between the edge of the table and an adjacent sleeper, became wedged there, possibly because the weight of the boy or his companions caused the table to sway to one side. The police were called shortly before 6 o'clock, but had to dig underneath and partly chop away the oak sleeper before the boy was released. His foot was badly crushed, but an X-ray examination at Victoria Hospital failed to show any bones actually broken. When the police arrived at the scene of the accident the boy did not appear to be suffering very severe pain, but the foot was swelling rapidly and consequently becoming wedged more tightly.

A wedding of interest to Londoners took place at Zanesville, Ohio, on March 21, when Miss Rita M. Stephens of this city became the bride of Addison R. Thomas of Liberty, Kentucky. The ceremony was quietly performed at 2 o'clock at the Grace M. E. parsonage, Rev. T. T. Crawford officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas will reside in Zanesville.

The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stephens, Douglas avenue, this city, and was very popular with a host of friends. Mr. Thomas is a member of the Mark Grey Baseball Club. He is a graduate of the University of Kentucky, and has played with a number of baseball teams in United States and Canada. He met his bride while pitching for the Tecumseh team.

BAN ON FARM IMPLEMENTS.

DUBLIN, March 25.—Among the articles which must not be imported after March 31 under the boycott of British manufacturers, says a decree adopted by the Dail Eireann today, are plows, mowing machines and agricultural machinery generally.

DOCTOR'S BACK MAY BE BROKEN

Little Hope Held For Recovery of Tillsburg Physician.

TILLSBURG, March 25.—Dr. J. R. Lancaster, who was so seriously injured yesterday, is in a very precarious condition, with only slight hopes of recovery. Two outside specialists were called in today, and both were of the opinion that the injured man's back is broken.

How he escaped instant death is a mystery, as the car is a total wreck and was dragged 50 feet, carrying before it the cattle guards at the crossing. It is very likely the authorities will request immediate protection at this crossing.

INGERSOLL INN SOLD.

INGERSOLL, March 25.—Joseph E. Rawson of Aylmer, completed a deal yesterday by which he becomes owner of the Ingersoll Inn. It is understood that the purchase price was \$12,000. The hotel was formerly the New Daly Hotel, and achieved a good deal of prominence all over the Dominion as a result of being the pioneer local option hotel. About eight years ago it was taken over by the Ingersoll Company, and conducted as a local option hotel to meet the new conditions. It was most successful, and as a result was visited by delegations from all over the country. It has been conducted by Mr. and Mrs. V. N. Dyer.

IS NOW IN JAIL.

WINDSOR, March 25.—John Warlow, who shot his wife in Walkerville Saturday night last and then turned the gun on himself, was released from Hotel Dieu Hospital this afternoon and removed to Sandwich jail.
